“Enter the 3rd Dimension with John Swank Oct 7”

Remember the Viewmaster you had as a kid? Ever see a 3-D movie? Did you know some people are still using cameras with two lenses? One of them, **John Swank**, will share his 3-D obsession with us on Oct 7. He will use a special slide projector that uses two lenses and Polaroid filters to superimpose two slightly differing images on a silver screen. Viewers must wear special glasses (which he will provide) to decode the images for each eye.

John has been actively shooting stereo images for five years, mainly using an antique Kodak stereo camera (c. 1954). His subjects include many Washington area scenes, as well as shots of Yellowstone, Hawaii, and Alaska. The program will include an award-winning series of photos taken in New York City in June 2000, featuring the World Trade Center.

In addition, John will talk about his collection of 3-D material, particularly sets of antique stereo-views of World War I, a world tour, and U.S. presidents (Trivia: Did you know Ike was an enthusiastic stereo photographer?) He also will discuss how to find and view a wealth of 3-D photos on the Web. (Some from his collection can be found at www.marad.dot.gov/3dot/Good_old_days/index.htm)

John retired from the Federal government a year ago. His career included serving as campaign manager and press secretary for a member of Congress, and as public affairs officer for the FAA in Kansas City and the Maritime Administration. In addition to stereo photography, he has been developing his digital skills and marketing fine art prints as Frameworthy Photos (www.fwphotos.com).

We will take John to dinner at the Olive Garden, Tysons Corner, at 6 p.m. Oct 7. Oct 9 Field Trip

Full Moonrise at the Iwo Jima Memorial.

Last month we had a good crowd at the Tidal Basin despite the rainy weather. I ran into people from both NVPS and MWCC and met others from the Gaithersburg and North Bethesda clubs.

It looked early on like the overcast was not going to permit a view of the moon, so many of us were framing night shots of the Monument and Memorial. As I was getting ready to leave, someone called out, "There it is!" (I was out of film and had to run back to the car for more.)

The moon was a little high by then, but because of the haze it was not blown out and there were some great golden reflections in the Tidal Basin. In all it was a good night for shooting. I think that everyone there was successful. But I hope the weather is better this time. - Also: I have found a better place for everyone to meet for Field Trips. This will now always be the place where we meet before going to any field trip.

Oct 9 Full Moonrise over the Mall

The grounds of the Iwo Jima Memorial provide one of the best locations to photograph the moonrise over the Capitol and monuments. The best location to shoot from across the river lies in front of the Netherlands Carillon. (This is because there are fewer distracting signs and lights in the foreground.) This will be the last time for the next 6 months that the moon will be rising near the east-west line from the Lincoln Memorial to the Capitol. In November the full moonrise will be almost 20 degrees farther north than in October.

On Oct 9, Thursday, the moon will be rising at 6:40 p.m. which will be the most opportune time for photography. Sunset occurs at 6:39 p.m. and civil

twilight ends at 7:06 with nautical twilight (when it becomes too dark to discern objects without the assistance of other sources of ambient light) ending about a half hour later. Before sunset, the sky is so bright that the moon is relatively faint. After nautical twilight the moon becomes so bright that it will be blown out when exposing for the landscape.

The edge of the moon comes above the horizon at 6:40. Based on the fact that the moon travels its diameter every 6 minutes, I estimate that around 6:55 it should be visible above the landscape. It also moves toward the south as it rises so that at the time it becomes visible it will be a couple of degrees south of due east. Note, however, that the location of the Carillon is also south of the Mall axis so the parallax will make the moon appear as if it was rising south of the Capitol and it will continue to arc even farther south.

A lens of around 200mm is recommended for shooting the monuments. A longer lens will be better if the moonrise aligns well with the mall axis. The best time for photography will be 5-10 minutes after it becomes visible. Even then, if there is color in the sky during the twilight hours, there will likely be some good compositions with shorter focal length lenses as the moon continues to elevate and move farther south.

There are a number of references for determining exposures for night photography and, in particular, for photographing the moon above the landscape:

Directions:

- Northbound on I-66 or US-50 exit onto VA-110 going southeast. Almost immediately after turning off you will see a sign to the Iwo Jima Memorial. Turn right into the entrance and follow the road around to the back (south) side of the Memorial where there is parking. Walk over to the front of the Netherlands Carillon where you will see a large group of photographers, including a lot of strangers.

- Northbound on I-395 exit onto VA-110 going northwest. When you are near US-50 and I-66 you will see a sign for the Iwo Jima Memorial. Turn left into the entrance and continue as described above.

Set up your tripod and camera and wait for the moon to rise. It is advisable to arrive a half hour before sunset to have good light to set up your camera gear. A flashlight is also recommended.

WSP Workshops Offered

Judy Reisman and **John Witschey**, both instructors at the Washington School of Photography in Bethesda, MD will be leading two outdoor photo tours this fall through WSP.

The first is *Fall Colors in the West Virginia Highlands*, Oct 11-13, timed to coincide with the peak of the magnificent Fall colors in scenic eastern West VA., where elevations range to nearly 5,000 ft. In addition to the foliage, photographic opportunities include mountain rivers tumbling through steep ravines, old-growth forests, Seneca Rocks towering 900 feet over the North Fork River and a private after-hours tour of a major commercial cavern. Cost: \$370 plus \$25 transportation/admission fee.

The second is the *Magic of the Eastern Shore*, Nov 7-9. Isolated for hundreds of years by the natural barrier of the Chesapeake Bay, Maryland's Eastern Shore offers photographic opportunities found nowhere else in the U.S. We will shoot historic towns and out-of-the-way fishing villages, skipjacks and other workboats in quiet harbors, watermen as they practice their centuries-old trade, and the sunrise at Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge, home to bald eagles and countless waterfowl. Cost \$295 plus \$20 transportation fee.

Each workshop includes a pre-tour study packet, indoor instruction and plenty of time in the field at pre-scouted locations with on-site advice, demonstrations, and tips. Fall Foliage Photo Ops

Mother Nature is giving us a wonderful opportunity to record her Autumn show on film and memory cards. Here are two of my favorite places to shoot a variety of Fall foliage and landscape subjects. The first is Graves Mountain in Syria, Virginia about 90 minutes from Northern Virginia. The reward at the end of the drive is well worth the time, especially the food at Graves Mountain Lodge.

In the Graves Mountain area, there are waterfalls, meandering creeks, small churches, red barns, and majestic mountain views that are accessible from main roads. This area is photogenic even if the weather is not picture postcard clear. Just remember that if the sky does not contribute to the overall picture, leave it out of the image and focus on smaller details. Anyway, Fall foliage colors are more intense on overcast days.

To get to Graves Mountain just follow I-66 west to Gainesville, and take Rte 29 South towards Charlottesville; when approaching Culpeper, take the Rte 29 by-pass; approximately seven miles after Culpeper, look for Rte 609 on the right. I believe the road sign says, "Haywood." Take Rte 609 through Haywood to Rte 231. Right turn on Rte 231 North. You're only briefly on Rte 231. At the store bear left and take Rte 670 to Syria. Now, you're driving along the Robinson River and through Criglersville.

After Criglersville, you have arrived in the Graves Mountain area. Now look for the Graves Mountain apple warehouse on the left and the store on the right. Take and follow the road in front of the warehouse/store (right turn on Rte 643). This road offers many photo opportunities, including a small charming white church beside a tumbling creek.

After the church, Rte 643 bears to the right. Immediately on the left, there is a red barn at the foot of the mountain, and another small red structure is at the top of the hill. Turn around at the top of the hill and backtrack to the end of the road. Now, take a right turn on Rte 600 and follow this road along the creek to the White Oak Canyon parking lot. Now back to the Rte 670 and take a right turn and go pass Graves Mountain Lodge. Follow Rte 670 to the first left turn after the lodge (Rte 648) and cross the bridge over the Rose River.

Follow this road up the mountain and a small creek will reward you with water cascading over rocks on the left near the end of the road, and there is parking beside the stream on the right. Now, you should be ready for a break and feel quite hungry. A real home

cooked meal at the lodge will recharge you for an afternoon of exploring other roads and shooting. Please note that the Graves Mountain Lodge serves family-style and reservations must be made in advance. Also, the lodge is very busy this time of the year with tour groups and day visitors. Call: 540-923-4231 or fax 540-923-4312 for breakfast/lunch/dinner reservations. I prefer a late lunch and use most of my morning shooting.

After lunch, explore other roads around the area for Fall foliage opportunities or visit the warehouse/store for some tasty apples, decorative gourds, and pumpkins. In your zeal to take foliage pictures, watch where you step and set up your tripod. The area has numerous poisonous snakes that can camouflage themselves among dried leaves and among rocks and decayed logs. This warning comes from firsthand experience.

Closer to home is the U.S. National Arboretum in Northeast Washington, D.C. The Arboretum offers a variety of flora and fauna to photograph, not only in the Fall but also anytime of the year. The nice part about photographing at the Arboretum is that you can drive and park any place along its roads. Therefore, you can take all of your photo equipment, and it is still accessible in the car when needed. In addition to the beautiful Capitol Columns in the meadow, the red Japanese Pagoda in the Asian Collection is well worth a short walk from the roadway.

However, my favorite areas are the National Herb Garden, Fern Valley, and the Capitol Columns. At the Arboretum, it is difficult to run out of interesting subjects to photograph, especially in the Fall. Also, during the Fall, I have found that late afternoon is a good time to photograph the Capitol Columns with Fall foliage in the background. Oh! Don't forget the aquatic flowers around the Administration building.

You don't need fancy or expensive photographic equipment to capture landscape images at the Arboretum. I find myself using a short zoom lens with a polarizer or 81-A or B filters most of the time, and I would never think of shooting any kind of landscapes or outdoor subjects without a tripod.

The Arboretum is located in northeast Washington, D.C., off New York Avenue (Rte 50) and Bladensburg Road. The entrance is located on the New York Avenue service road. The gates are open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily, including weekends.

Erie Color Slide Mounts

During the **Chuck Veatch/Ed Funk** workshop on multiple-images, a number of members asked about remounting slides, say for sandwiching two slides together, or masking out parts of an image. One such slide mount is the Gepe mount. This is available from most camera stores. For masking, you would use a very thin silver mylar tape. Another mount is the Erie Slide Mount. These mounts come with a template with different sized masks which you can hold over a slide and determine how much masking you need. The masks are round-cornered or square. The mounts and masks are available from Erie Color Slide Club Inc, PO Box 672, Erie, PA 16512.

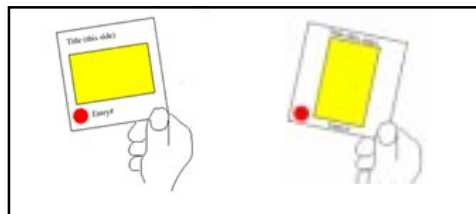
Smithsonian Photo Contest
