Sep. 6 Program: Tony Sweet on "Digital Nature Photography"

Tony is the author of *Fine Art Nature Photography: Advanced Techniques and the Creative Process*, *Fine Art Flower Photography: Creative Techniques And The Art Of Observation*. After 20 years as a professional jazz artist, he changed careers and directed his creative juices towards nature photography. The improvisational, spontaneous, and abstract nature of jazz are also integral elements of his nature photography.

Today, his work is published on greeting cards, calendars, post cards, posters, annual reports, catalogs, and electronic mediums. He is represented by Digital Vision in NYC, The Orion Stock agency in Japan, and Pictor/Uniphoto and Woodfall Wild Images in the UK. Tony conducts photography workshops from Apr. thru Oct. Tony's articles and photography are featured in Shutterbug magazine in the 'Pro Tips' column, Rangefinder Magazine, and as contributor to Nikonnet.com. He uses digital technology to produce fine art giclee' prints which are exhibited in private and corporate collections throughout the United States. Tony is a member of Fuji's 'Talent Team 2000' and the Baltimore chapter of ASMP.

He also instructs inspiring online courses at BetterPhoto.com, Image Design: Revealing Your Personal Vision, Fine Art Flower Photography, The Four Essential Filters for Film and Digital Cameras, and The Four Essential Filters (2nd Session). Sherwin Kaplan has been a member of the Northern Virginia Photographic society since 1986 and has served in various NVPS Board positions, including President in 1990-91. In June, 2005, NVPS awarded him the *Joe Acheson Memorial Award* for his service to the club. He has been NVPS' "Photographer of the Year" six times in the Advanced Slides competition category, won NVPS' "Slide of the Year" twice in that category and, when he competed in GWCCC competitions, won numerous awards, including First Place in Master or Advanced competitions in the Architectural, Pictorial and Nature categories. Three of his slides were included in the submission to Nature's Best International Photo Competition which won First Place in the Camera Club category for NVPS in 2003.

As a result, one of his images was published in the magazine and exhibited in the Smithsonian Institution. He has also judged and presented programs at numerous camera clubs and other forums in the Washington, D.C. area. He uses Nikon 35 mm equipment, shoots color slides exclusively and specializes in nature, wildlife, macro, travel, and landscape photography. His film of choice is Fuji Velvia, although he uses Fuji's Provia F 100 in high contrast situations. He has not yet entered the digital age. He uses a tripod for just about everything. When not involved in photography, Sherwin is an attorney in the Washington office of Thelen Reid & Priest specializing in litigation, pension and health law matters.

Competition News and Reminders

New competition rules were passed on Apr. 5, 2005 and go into effect starting with the Sep. 2005 competition. The new rules are available for review on the NVPS web site. The Competition Theme Committee chose competition themes for the next two years. These competitions will be timed competitions, where the original image capture must have occurred within 2 years of the competition date. Please note that extra effort has been made by the workshop and field trip chairpersons to coordinate their activities with the upcoming competition themes.

Themed Competitions in 2005-2006

1. Night - Images taken after sunset and before sunrise. (Competition Nov. 2005)
2. Hands and/or Eyes - Images where a person's or animal's eye(s) or hand(s) or both are a predominant part of the picture. (Competition Feb. 2006)
3. Close-up/Macro - Images that result from the use of close-up lenses, macro lenses, close-up rings, etc., where the full image represents an area of 10" X 15" or smaller in the "real world". (Competition May 2006)

Themed Competitions in 2006-2007

1. Motion - An image that depicts motion, action and/or movement using different photographic techniques, like slow shutter speed, panning, zooming, stop action, etc. Water may NOT be the main subject of the competition.
2. Abstract - Abstracts are the poetry of photography, free verse written in color and tone, producing poem of mood, feeling, and emotion. Abstracts are characterized by designs depicting no immediately recognizable object.
3. Reflections - Images that include the use of reflections including in water, buildings, mirrors, glass or any other reflective material. Remember: All competition submissions MUST be checked in before 7:45 P.M. to assure your photos are included in the competition. Refrain from making comments during a competition class. Mats for prints can be no larger than 20" x 20", and must not fall apart, or have any potential to damage other prints. Mark slides in the lower left corner with an easily seen spot to indicate how the image should be projected, and put your name on the back side of the slide mount.

I am pleased to announce my schedule for this year's Leaning Toward Light Nature Photography Workshop and Seminars series. If you live near Washington, D.C. or Iowa City, IA, I hope you will consider enrolling. Last year they were quite well-received. Memorials of Washington Field Trip

Saturday Night Sep. 24 at 6:00 P.M.

Meeting at the Tidal Basin Paddle Boat Parking Lot, a Group Gathering Follows. This field trip is in support of October's "Night Photography" themed competition.

Come spend the evening with us as we photograph the memorials and monuments on the Washington Mall. Although we are beginning an hour before sunset to take advantage of the "magic" evening light, pictures taken before sunset (7:00 PM) are not eligible for entry in October's competition.

Of course, they are eligible for any of our non-themed competitions. I've included photos taken by **Josh Taylor** during a recent visit to the Mall. I am in the process of securing a permit for use of tripods on the National Mall, Washington Monument, and the Jefferson, Korean, Vietnam, Lincoln, FDR and WWII

Memorials. This permit may not be necessary, however, in hopes of averting any possible problems during our shoot, I am working my way through the permit process.

We will meet at 6:00 P.M. in the tidal basin paddle boat parking lot which is located at the corner of Independence Ave. and 15th Street. The

entrance to the lot is on 15th Street. For those interested in getting together afterwards, we will meet at 9:30 in the paddle boat parking lot. From there we will head over to the Barnside Diner. It is located at 6306 Little River Turnpike (route 236) in Alexandria. Leaving Washington we will be taking I-395 South to Exit 3B (Little River Turnpike West). Travel through the traffic light at Beauregard Street, past McDonalds, and Barnside Diner will be on the right.

For those members that are unable to join us, another night photography opportunity worth considering is either the Frederick County Fair (Sep. 16-24) or the Virginia State Fair (Sep. 22 - Oct. 2). Many wonderful night time images can be taken at these places and there will still be time to get your film processed before the October competition. Oct. 14-16 Field Trip

Highland Scenic Highway - Fall Foliage

Oct. 14 - 16 Summersville, WV - RESERVE YOUR ROOM TODAY!

This overnight field trip takes us to the beautiful Allegheny Highlands of West Virginia at the peak (I hope.) of the Fall color. Jim Clark has immortalized this area in his book "West Virginia, The Allegheny Highlands."

Richwood, which is 25 miles east of Summersville, is located at the western end of the 46-mile Highland Scenic Highway. The first 23 mile section of the highway is along WV-39/55 from Richwood to the Cranberry Mountain Nature Center. Last October the Fall color along this section of the highway was outstanding with miles of unbelievably brilliant yellow leaves.

Along this section of the highway I suggest visits to Summit Lake, Cranberry Glades Botanical Area, The Falls of Hill Creek and the Cranberry Mountain Nature Center. From the nature center the scenic highway follows WV-150 north for another 23 miles. This is the Parkway section of the highway and is the region's highest road - at 4500 feet above sea level.

It has four developed scenic overlooks each with restrooms and a picnic shelter. For more detailed information go to www.fs.fed.us/r9/mnf and click on "Special Places."

Also in the vicinity (30 miles away) is Glade Creek Grist Mill at Babcock State Park (It's on the cover of Jim Clark's book.) and on Oct. 15 "Bridge Day 2005" is taking place in Fayetteville, WV. (20 miles away) Bridge Day is great, if you enjoy watching people

jump from an 876 foot high bridge. See last October's Fotofax Field Trip notice. If you would like to visit these places, plan on spending the major part of the day. For more information, enter "Bridge Day 2005" or "Babcock State Park" into Google.

We will be staying in Summersville, WV at the Super 8 motel, www.super8.com - I encourage you to make your reservations soon, since this is their busy time of the year. Phone (800) 800-8000 or (304) 872-4888. Room rates start at \$60 a night. Friday and Saturday nights we will gather in the lobby at 7:30 for our traditional group dinner.

The quickest route to Summersville is to go west on I-66, south on I-81, west on I-64, west on US-60, and then at the Fayetteville exit turn north onto US-19. Follow US-19 to Summersville. This is approximately a 300 mile trip and will take at least 5 hours. If you are interested in car pooling, please let me know. AND THE DIGITAL IMAGE

Is Digital Cheaper or Better ?

Here is a reprint of a letter to Pop Photo Magazine of July 2005 from **Donald A. Patrick of Apex, NC.**

Point...

You say, "if you don't own a digital SLR...you have officially run out of excuses." I disagree, here's why.

1. The Canon EOS 20D streets for \$1380, body only!
2. With the 1.6x 35mm lens factor, a true wide-angle lens costs \$1550.
3. The 8.25 MP (megapixel) resolution is noticeably less than that of film.
4. Printing, projecting, and file management capabilities are dubious.
5. Battery charges, a laptop computer, and additional high-capacity memory cards are required.

With film, every shot's a permanent image at maximum resolution, no computer needed. Have we film photographers really run out of excuses? Hardly!

This **Editor** found the above letter to Pop Photo Magazine amusing. When you talk to so many digital shooters today, they seem surprised that many of us have not switched to digital by now. I find it odd that just because something is there we're supposed to wrap ourselves around it with joy and leave behind all we've used in the last 40 years.

It's odd at times surfing around on AOL in the photography chats that I find a few individuals shooting with their digital cameras but they ask me "what is an image-editing program?" This tells me they've jumped into digital without knowing what all is involved. How can anyone be such a novice to digital and NOT know they need software to work with their photos?

I hate to be the one to break the news to them that in addition to their digital camera, they'll also need an image-editing program, a computer to run it on, a lot of time to learn the program, time to learn the operating system on their computer, an ink-jet printer to make photos, paper and ink supplies, batteries, chargers, memory cards, card readers, cables, time to learn the digital camera with more dials, knobs, buttons and screens, and an ISP Internet

account to e-mail their photos. I'm sure this list could be longer.

For someone just starting out in photography digital may be the way to go if they've not worked in film photography. But for those of us with a dozen film cameras to feed, I see no reason to worry about going to digital any time soon. Why wait? The prices will go down and the equipment will get better every 9 months.

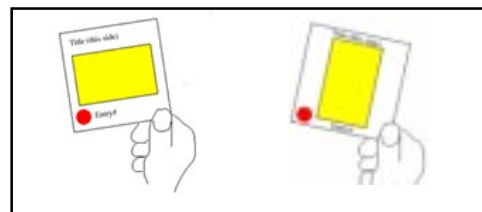
We also think that someone starting out new should decide which way to go and for what reasons (film or digital). The two will be around for a while and be working together for many more years. Of course the hand-writing is on the wall when you see companies ceasing production of their film cameras and now making lenses for digital cameras (Bronica). Film is not dead yet. When a client asks me for digital I tell them that they may have the negatives scanned and put onto a DVD or CD-ROM.

I currently only have to worry about posing, lighting, and getting the job done. I don't want to have to worry about "white balance" right now. Also, whether one shoots in film or digital, in medium format or a point and shoot, the great equalizer is a blank piece of paper or a blank screen on which the image is shown. It is not what you use, film or digital, but how you use it. The end result will always be "the image."

100th Program for Photographers of Northern Virginia

The World is Coming To An End

Kodak drops black&white printing papers

Kodak has announced they are dropping the production and sale of black&white printing papers at the end of this year. They say their sales are off on this product about 25% less each year. They WILL keep making black&white films and developing chemicals to process them. Let's hope Ilford and Agfa don't make the same announcement.

Other than the 25% loss of sales each year on this product, Kodak says digital-imaging systems have caused this to happen.

In another announcement, Kodak has completed its purchase of Creo, a maker of commercial-use digital-printing software and scanning hardware equipment. Creo makes high-end quality scanners. This is another step in Kodak becoming a digital-imaging company.

In other related matters, Kodak discontinued recently the production of slide projectors, laid off about 10,000 employees 2 years ago, and now plans to lay off about 15,000 soon. This totals about one fourth of all Kodak employees gone. Kodak has also ceased production of its two professional level DSLRs because of technical problems. The bleeding continues onward.

What Makes a Good Picture?

Responding to pictures is largely a matter of personal taste. The elements of a photograph somehow combine and strike a chord for one person, while for another the image may mean little. Yet some pictures have a quality that everyone can recognize and appreciate.

Apart from a subject's inherent interest, two things are important in a picture: composition and light. Also needed are depth and perspective in the composition. Also we need balance and asymmetry, shape and form, pattern and texture.

These are at the core of creative photography. And by first following some basic rules in a systematic way, you can learn to recognize and use these pictorial elements instinctively. Light itself is fundamental to all the elements.

In a sense, light makes photographs; photographers only take/make them.

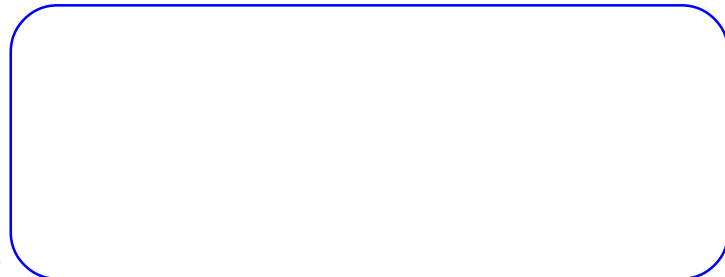
