

September 1, 2020 – Nikhil Bahl – *Photographic Voice and Vision*



Nikhil Bahl, a long-term friend of NVPS, will talk to us on September 1st about *Photographic Voice and Vision*.

Every photographer should think about how they can find their photographic voice. Once a photographer has found their voice, they can then start to develop their vision. It takes time, but both these aspects are essential to the growth of any photographer. Nikhil will define photographic voice and vision and share his thoughts on how you can develop your photography to speak about who you are as a photographer and what you want to express. This presentation will help you to think about your photography more deeply.

Nikhil Bahl is a full-time professional photographer, author, educator, and environmentalist residing in the Washington D.C. area. Drawing continuous inspiration from nature, Nikhil adopts novel approaches and seeks meaningful interpretations to create photographs that transcend the commonplace, reflect deeper insights, and convey an enchantment of the subject's beauty.

An offshoot of Nikhil's fine art photography and love of nature is his documentation of wildlife behaviors and habitats. As a volunteer with the National Park Service and U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, his goal is to portray environmental stories with an artistic appeal, so his photographs educate and motivate about the imperative of conservatio

October 6, 2020 - Mollie Issacs - Lightroom Unleashed

Mollie Issacs will present *Lightroom Unleashed* to NVPS on Tuesday October 6th.



Mollie Issacs is a professional photographer specializing in nature, wildlife, abstracts and flower photography. She runs **Awake the Light Photo Workshops and Tours**, leading educational and inspirational photo workshops across the country and around the world. Mollie loves sharing her passion for photography with others.

Early in her career Mollie studied with Ansel Adams and Joyce Tenneson. Her work is in the Permanent Collection of the

International Photography Hall of Fame. She has been exhibited at Epcot Center in Disney Work and Grand Central Station In New York City. Mollie is a 15-time winner of the Kodak Gallery Award, considered by some to be the "Oscar of Photography".

In addition to photographing nature and wildlife, Mollie is a portrait photographer. She is honored to have photographed many famous faces including Meryl Streep, jazz musician Wynton Marsalis, the late Supreme Court justice Antonin Scalia, actor Gary Busey, former Virginia Governor L. Douglas Wilder, and many other notables and dignitaries.

Mollie has authored a coffee table photography book plus educational photography e-books.

Mollie lives at the Outer Banks of North Carolina and enjoys all things beachy. You can find her website at Awake the Light.

Mollie believs Adobe Lightroom is the most powerful post-processing software available. It is simple to use and easy to learn, BUT often photographers find it complicated or confusing. Mollie's *Lightroom Unleashed* program will clear up many misconceptions and show us how easy, fast, and foolproof using Lightroom can be. If you have tried Lightroom but found it difficult or time-consuming, OR if you have been reluctant to use it because you thought it would be hard to learn OR if you erroneously thought you would have to change your entire image filing and storage system (which you do not) this program will help give you more confidence and better skills.

Mollie will lead us through edits of several images to demonstrate Lightroom capabilities. This will done by demonstrating the before and after images along with processing workflow. Please see some example of before and after images on the following page.













November 3, 2020 – Joe Rossbach – *From Ordinary to Extraordinary*



Join NVPS on Tuesday November 3rd for Joseph Rossbach's talk: *Make the Ordinary the Extraordinary.*

Joseph Rossbach's quest as a landscape and nature photographer is to showcase wild, beautiful and unique natural locations and to use his creative vision to capture those landscapes in high quality and evocative images

which inspire awe in the viewer, respect for the natural world and ultimately a greater appreciation of wilderness and wilderness preservation.

Joe's images have been published hundreds of times and he has co-authored two books on nature photography: *The Ultimate Guide to Digital Nature Photography* (Mountain Trail Press) and *50 Amazing Things You Must See and Do in the Greater D.C. Area*: The *Ultimate Outdoor Adventure Guide* (Mountain Trail Press).

Even though Joe lives in the Metro DC area, he spends an average of 180 days a year in the field chasing the light and leading photography workshops and tours in the US and abroad. He also teaches online classes on the art of nature and landscape photography through ShutterMonkeys.


In this presentation, Joe will present one image only and take us on a deep dive into the production of the image. From planning and travel to scouting on location, Joe will discuss how he found a shot like this, what it takes to get there and how you can use tools like the Photographers Ephemeris and Google maps to help you be in the right place at the right time.

Then Joe will discuss what he did in the field to achieve the best composition, light and selection of equipment to make the image. The shot he will be presenting required focus stacking to achieve an angle of view not available through traditional means. Joe will us through the process of how to properly focus stack the image in camera.

After getting the shot, he will discuss processing in both Adobe Lightroom and Photoshop. Joe will explain how he preps the images in the raw convert, making changes to exposure, color and sharpening, before bringing the images into Photoshop to focus stack the image. Also in Photoshop, Joe will talk about how he uses luminosity masks and a variety of techniques including dodging and burning, paint







NVPS Competitions

The third Tuesday of each month is Competition Night. Members can submit digital color images and monochrome digital images into the competition. During the year NVPS conducts nine (9) competitions. Three competitions have themes; five (5) have no themes; and one (Oldies) permits images made outside the three-year limit applicable to the other 8 competitions (please note the change from the 2 year to 3 year time limit was made due to the covid-19 modification made for the 2020-2021 competitions).


Here are descriptions of the three themed competitions for the 2020-2021 NVPS calendar year:

- **A Musician:** The subject must be singlular; it may be in a group but depth of field, processing, etc. should make it obvious that all attention is on one individual. Subjects are confined just to humans. Competition date is October 20, 2020.
- **Fall Harvest:** Farms to Farmers Markets. A colorful time of year when produce is being farmed and sold. Land crops only, to reflect the colors. or work gathering and selling the fall harvest. Competition date is December 15, 2020.
- **Fountains:** A man-made ornamental structure that pumps water. No shortage of fountains locally but anywhere in the world is fine. Rain or shine, day or night, literal or abstract. Competition date is April 20, 2021.

Steve Gottlieb will judge NVPS's September competition. There is no theme for this competition.

Thousands of Steve's photographs—ranging from architecture to people to landscapes—have been published worldwide. His images have been featured in *Shutterbug, Popular Photography, American Photo, Rangefinder,* and *Photo District News*, among others. He is the photographer—as

well as author and designer—of six books, including *American Icons, Washington: Portrait of a City, FLUSH: Celebrating Bathrooms Past & Present,* and *Abandoned America.*

Abandoned America was selected by both People Magazine and USA Today as "Gift Book of the Year." Shutterbug referred to Steve as "a gifted photographer and author." Other recognition includes "Advertising Photograph of the Year" in both NYC and Washington, DC.



Education & Training

September 8, 2020 – Jim Sinsheimer – *Understanding Photoshop Layers*

Join NVPS members on September 8th to learn Jim Sinsheimer about *Photoshop Layers and Masks* as part of our Education & Training sessions.



As we all know, Photoshop is an awesome editing tool for photographers. It has many choices with regard to tools that provide virtually unlimited editing possibilities. One of the most versatile capabilities is use of layers in the workflow process. In Jim's presentation, he will review what a layer is, the different types of layers, what basic editing can be done with them, and discuss masking, which unlocks the full potential of Photoshop layers. The

presentation will be live (Jim will do actual editing). However, don't feel you'll need to take copious notes for he has prepared a PowerPoint file of the editing to be posted on the NVPS website.

Jim's introduction to photography was at around 7 years old when his Dad converted a coal bin into his darkroom. His interest really took off in college. Jim has been a member of NVPS for two years, having moved to Virginia from Southern California to be with his grandson and his family. Jim's work has been published in Black and White Magazine, LensWork, and will be soon featured again in LensWork's "Our Magnificent Planet." He's had showings at the California Department of Transportation Headquarters, the 1650 Gallery in Los Angeles and currently in a large digital wall at the 71 South Wacker building in Chicago. For several years, his images have won awards at the Orange County (CA) fair.

Jim has been a Canon shooter forever - he still has his FTB, TL and F1 cameras as "museum" pieces. Travel photography to Finland for the Northern Lights was planned, but is now on hold due to the pandemic.

October 13, 2020 – Gary Perlow– *A Workflow from Raw to Print*

Gary Perlow's October E&T presentation is titled: *A Workflow from Raw to Print.* This presentation will be an in-depth description of a linear logical approach to photograph editing that will take you from a raw file straight out of camera through Photoshop to printing. It will be geared to novice and experienced users of Photoshop. Topics will be discussed that will shed light on what should be done, when it should be done, and why it should be done.



The programs used will be Bridge, Adobe Camera Raw, and Photoshop. The why and wherefore of raw processing will be

discussed in depth. Then Gary will take a picture into Photoshop and demonstrate the steps to edit non-destructively and get the absolute most out of your picture to produce a "clean" image before taking a look at artistic effects, cropping and sharpening.

Gary first picked up a camera about 7 years ago to photograph his daughter's academic athletic events and realized the powerful effect that careful post-processing could have on an image. He found that the marriage of the two, photography and Photoshop, brought a welcome and readily accessible outlet for creativity. In fact, he enjoys post-processing at least as much as he does taking photographs. He enjoys talking Photoshop, and invites anyone at NVPS at any level to discuss anything about post-processing with him.

Gary shoots a wide variety of images aimed at producing an emotional response: portraits, nature, landscapes, architecture, and things. In future, he hopes to get more into creative, imaginative edits and mood photography that transcend reality if ever so slightly. In the 2019 Nature Visions Expo, he won best landscape, best wildlife, and best in show. This past year at the club, he won the advanced digital photographer of the year, the advanced color prints photographer of the year, and the advanced versatile photographer of the year.

November 10, 2020 – Kathryn Mohrman & Stan Bysshe – *Anonymous Critique*



Our November E&T Tuesday will be an Anonymous Critique conducted by Kathryn Mohrman and Stan Bysshe. Take this opportunity to get feedback on your images. Submit images you are using new software to process; images you like but feel need just a little help, or images you may consider for a competition. The sole purpose of anonymous critique is to help you grow as a photographer. You will not be identified unless you choose to make comments or ask questions about your images.

The firm deadline for image submission is 6 p.m. on Monday, November 2, 2020, to allow time for our

computer team to anonymize the images and for Kathryn and Stan to review them before the November 10 meeting.

You can submit up to three images. Please prioritize them by naming them as follows: number title, where number is 1, 2, or 3, followed by an underscore and anything you'd like for a title. For example, "1_Red House on the Prairie." Putting the number first will allow us to sort the images so that at least one image from every photographer is critiqued. Beyond that, Kathryn and Stan will critique as many images as time allows.



Please submit your images to <u>critique-2020@nvps.org</u>, sized the same as for competition: jpeg images with a maximum of 1400 pixels wide and 1050 pixels high (vertical shots have the same 1050 pixel height requirement), sRGB workspace. We recommend your jpeg images be 127 pixels per inch (PPI, sometimes called dots per inch or DPI) or less (e.g., 127, 96 or 72 PPI) for best results on Zoom. If you send the images from Mac mail, please select the "actual size" option from the "image size" menu in the upper right corner.





Given a blank sheet of paper in elementary school with an assignment to draw something terrified Jerri as she could never come up with something original. Then in seventh grade she took the art elective which opened composition, rule of thirds, perspective, color wheels, light, shadow, and how to make something uniquely mine. Since her teenage years she explored various forms of needlework and quilting playing with patterns

and color combinations. All of this helped her as she took up photography seriously as she approached retirement from teaching and work as a school librarian.



Jerri attended college at East Stroudsburg State University and worked in the Poconos but never really had the time or money to vacation or explore the area. When a friend found a John Barkley trip to the Poconos, she signed up hoping to learn the basics of using a digital camera. Though the camera she borrowed for the class had a broken metal piece in the view finder she was able to capture some interesting images, learn the essentials of a digital camera and had a blast meeting fellow photographers. John suggested she deserved a better camera so she purchased her first digital camera, a Nikon D7000 and started visiting local parks and historical sites shooting whatever caught my eye. Most years her family visited Williamsburg at least once a year to get away from this century. That year she decided not to take traditional shots but ended up shooting fences, locks, historic tools and small details that mean so much but are often overlooked. Jerri was hooked.

As she neared retirement from teaching and being a school librarian, she wanted a hobby that her husband Jim and she could share. Joining NVPS gave her inspiration and allowed her to take photography to the next level learning processing skills, and other camera techniques. Jerri has since enjoyed varied field trips that pushed her

beyond family and landscape shooting, to shooting seasonal flowers, birds, old cars, trains, abstract images.



Inspired by all the beautiful bird images in competitions she took a class with Jim Clark in Chincoteague on shooting shore birds. Now Jim and Jerri visit several local parks getting up earlier than the birds to capture these wonderful creatures and other local wildlife. Moving to wildlife photography has inspired some of their favorite vacations to Yellowstone, both in summer and winter, to the Canadian Northwest, to Alaska, Maine and the Great Smokies.

Jerri currently shoots with a Nikon D500 with either an 18 to 200 lens or a Tamron 150 to 600 lens. She recently purchased a Nikon Z50 mirrorless camera with a 15 to 50 mm and 50 to 200 mm lenses and is trying to master mirrorless shooting. Jerri has been fortunate to have some of her images juried into Nature Visions and honored at the Waterford Fair.

In 2018 Jim and Jerri were lucky enough to travel to Brooks Falls National Park in Alaska to shoot the annual Brown bears salmon run. It was an awesome adventure being so close to these magnificent creatures. The first thing upon reaching camp the rangers gave a safety lesson on interacting in bear territory. It is approximately a mile hike from camp to the viewing platforms by the falls. Trails are not just for people, and part of the adventure is encountering them on the trail.

Jerri's presentation images feature bears of various ages, fishing, fighting, playing and even relaxing. She hopes you enjoy her work. These photos were shot with the Nikon D500 and the Tamron 150 to 600 mm lens. Most, but not all, were shot with a tripod.



October 27, 2020 - Alan Goldstein - Nine Days in Cuba



Alan Goldstein, our October Member's Gallery presenter, traveled to Cuba under the guidance of Denise Silva and RoadRunner Photography Tours in January 2019. Alan and a group of five other photographers visited and photographed in Havana and about a half dozen other sights and towns. For photographers, Cuba is a country of marvelous colors, interesting people and luscious landscapes. Alan will take you along on his nineday adventure in this gorgeous country.

A member of NVPS since 2012, Alan Goldstein has been involved in some way or other with photography for the past 60 years (not bad,



considering he's only 29!) It all began with a science teacher instructing him on the art of film developing. At that time, he was using a Kodak Brownie. Veering off during his teen-age years to using a 8mm movie camera, he returned to still photography during his college years and while working as a reporter for his hometown newspaper.

Alan was supposed to call in a newspaper photographer for photos, but she lived nearly 30 miles away, so he opted to take photos himself. At first, he used a Polaroid Type 103 for photos since it made instant, crisp pictures. But encouraged by a classmate and photographer, Alan got access to the college's darkroom, and processed Tri-X each time he had a news event or other photo request. This plus being a radio disc jockey probably contributed to his less-than-stellar GPA!

After graduating from college, Alan enlisted in the Navy, becoming a Navy Journalist and later a Public Affairs Officer.

His high school girlfriend had a Nikon SLR, and that became Alan's Holy Grail. As a low-ranking Navy man, Alan scraped up the money and bought his first true SLR -- a Minolta SRT-101. As he progressed up the Navy ranks, he upgraded to a Minolta X700.



Fast forward to 2003. Alan's brother-in-law was getting married and Alan was the photographer. An acquaintance who was a Nikon representative loaned Alan a D100. It was love at first click! Since then, Alan has had a D100, D200, D300, D800 and now a D810 and a D850. He also photographs with his DJI Phantom 4 Pro+ drone that carries a 20-megapixel camera.

Alan considers himself an advanced amateur, even though he has made more than five figures making pictures. His biggest job was making progress photos of the deconstruction and reconstruction of the D.C. public library in Georgetown. He photographed the progress of the building of the African-American Museum over a four-year period, gratis.

Retired from the Navy in 1994 and retired from Civil Service in 2011, Alan is happy to spend his time making images. He loves photographing just about everything, but really likes night scenes and landscapes. His photos have been used for greeting cards by non-profits, used for proposals by environmental entities, have been used by sports web sites, have appeared in newspapers, including *The Washington Post*, a museum, and even hang in a gas station.

Alan says he loves being a member of NVPS. He has gained some great friends, enjoys the camaraderie, and has learned something new nearly every meeting.





November 24, 2020 - Sidney N. Stone - GoWest Road Trip



As the walls of their apartment closed in on Joanna and Sidney, with Joanna working from home and Sidney wondering the streets in search of photographic opportunities, they decided the time was ripe for a trip to visit Jo's brother and sister-in-law in Whitefish, Montana. They weren't going to fly. They didn't want to stay in hotels or motels. And using campground facilities was not appealing. Taking a cue from Alan Goldstein they decided to rent an RV and as Horace Greeley said "Go West".

With the concept the planning began and quickly more than a visit and stay in Whitefish was hatched. Jo and Sidney laid out a six-week odyssey west with plans to visit National Parks along

One of Sidney's particular photography loves is shooting sports. In high school and college is was an official school sports photographer shooting football, baseball, swimming, golf, basketball (nothing better than sitting on the hardwood under the basket!). When his son Dan became his high school's football manager Sidney spent Saturday afternoons walking the sidelines and end zones snapping action shots. After shooting about 20 rolls of Ektachrome each game, getting it processed and scanned he went digital choosing Canon over Nikon. He still has his original Minolta SR-1 and has been recently shooting with it.

Today Sidney enjoys all types of photography genres – macro, flowers, water, action, street, portrait and more. If a picture can be made he likes to shoot it.

The monuments between the World War II memorial and the Lincoln Memorial on the Washington Mall take on a whole new life after dark. Although the Arlington Memorial Bridge will be under repair and the Jefferson Memorial will be undergoing restoration, there are many other attractions open and available. The Reflecting Pool, Lincoln Memorial, Korean War Memorial, Vietnam War Memorial, and the service men and women memorials are all down on the West side. The water fountains at the World War II memorial should also be going. Of course, there is also the District of Columbia War Memorial (World War I). The FDR memorial is another option and has many interesting subjects.

Tripods are generally accepted around the grounds provided the photographer is not blocking or hindering pedestrian traffic. Tripods inside the Lincoln Memorial are prohibited and park rangers will ask you not to use them (there are reports some rangers will look the other way, but that's the exception not the norm).

Sunset is anticipated at 7:20pm on the 11^{th} followed by Moonset at 3:330 p.m. (sorry, no moon)



Equipment you may want to bring along in addition to your camera include:

- Sturdy tripod
- Leave your super telephotos and fast glass at home
- Remote shutter or cable release may be useful to prevent camera shake on long exposures
- Filters optional (neutral density may be useful for long exposures)

Flash optional

Assemble at Reflecting Pool in front of Lincoln Memorial at 7 p.m. for a brief meet and greet.

Metered parking is available on Ohio Dr. SW as well as the parking lot at the Tidal Basin Paddle Boats. The cost is \$2.30 per hour with a three hour maximum (\$6.90 total). Carpools are recommended if you can travel with others in your extended "bubble". Please bring a mask and anticipate wearing the mask when around others. The hot air balloon launch occurs twice daily between 7 a.m. and 9 a.m. and between

November 14, 2020 - Great Falls National Park, Maryland



Please join us in applying what we learned from September's Education and Training session with Lynn Cates on photographing water as we explore Great Falls, Maryland.

The C&O tow path between the visitor center and the path to the Great Falls overlooks offers opportunities to capture wildlife, color, reflections, and more. Landscapes, details, abstracts, and more opportunities are available for what we hope will be peak fall season subjects.

We'll meet and greet outside the Great Falls Tavern Visitor Center restrooms. From there, we'll head South towards Washington, DC along the C&O tow path. There are several trails that branch off the towpath that you're welcome to explore as you practice your social distancing. About 0.3 miles from the Visitor's center is the Olmstead Island Trail that bridges the towpath to the primary overlook. Beware the bridge will bob up and down as pedestrians cross. It's also narrow so take care if you decide put a tripod down on the bridge. Anything you drop is instantly donated to the rocks and rapids below. Additional photographic opportunities are also available within another mile down the path towards Washington. Feel free to explore. Please

anticipate hiking on a compact gravelly path for about 1 mile or more. Bring comfortable hiking shoes and anticipate the cooler weather.

For those unfamiliar with the area, please be advised that sections of the Billy Goat Trail should not be traversed (especially with expensive camera gear) unless you're willing to accept the risks including steep drops and large rock scrambling. Parts of that trail can be considered strenuous and people frequently injure themselves. Also, as of July 3, 2020, this trail has also been designated one way going downstream towards Washington.

Tripods are widely accepted. Please be mindful when staking your spot and maintain your social distancing.



Sunrise is anticipated at 7:25 a.m.

Here are some equipment recommendations:

- A sturdy tripod
- Any and all glass will be useful, however if you want to pick out details of the falls consider a 200mm or longer lens with optional teleconverter. The estimates distance from the overlook to the middle of the falls is about 40 yards.

• Filters are optional, though a polarizer to eliminate glare may come in handy since you'll be shooting perpendicular to the sunrise. Neutral density filters can be used to take long exposures of the falls and moving Potomac waters.

When:

Saturday, November 14, 2020 from 7 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Rain date is Sunday, November 15, 2020 from 7 a.m. to 9:30 a.m.



Where:

We'll assemble briefly at the Great Falls Tavern Visitor Center / restrooms adjacent to the parking lot. If you don't see us there, head south towards Washington, DC until you reach the overlook trailhead. You're certain to run into other members.

Entrance fees increased in January 2020. The current rate per car is \$20. If you walk into the park, the cost is \$10. The fee buys you a permit allowing you to reenter both sides of Great Falls (Maryland and Virginia) for up to seven days from the date issued. America the Beautiful and Great Falls Annual pass holders gain free entry. If you're on the fence about getting an America the Beautiful pass, know that the cost of the Great Falls Annual pass can be put towards upgrading to the America the Beautiful pass.

Carpools are recommended to save you cash provided you can travel with others in your extended "bubble". Please remember to bring a mask and anticipate wearing the mask while around others. Please also be patient and remain the recommended six feet away from other visitors.

Treasurer's Report

During the last NVPS club year, 2019-2020, Board member expenses were kept within the budget.



Annual expenditures during [COVID-reduced] 2019-20 were:

- \$3,640 for the meeting hall rental at Dunn Loring Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department [the club's largest annual expense];
- \$1,000 for monthly Competition judges honoraria, \$164 for meals and \$328 for about 3 years of monthly ribbons;
- \$582 for End of Year {EOY} Competition ribbons, trophies, plaques, and certificates:
- \$800 for Programs speaker honoraria and \$159 for meals;
- \$500 for liability insurance;
- \$746 for Zoom fees, Membership & Board supplies, funeral florals, PSA membership & miscellaneous; and,
- \$628 for about 3 years of Spudz as gifts for speakers and judges.

Total expenses for the 2019-2020 NVPS year were \$8,542.

The EOY Banquet was cancelled & no new equipment purchases were needed for laptop or digital image projection.

Income from Membership dues was \$10,191. The coffee fund and sale of Spudz micro-cloths contributed \$225.

The NVPS bank account balance on 22 June 2020 was \$12,217, which will increase as dues payments are received in Aug. through Oct.


Mentor Program

Topics include improving understanding of your camera's controls and menus; photographing various subjects, e.g., landscape, travel, nature wildlife, macro/close-up, or portraits; use of processing software; and, printing and matting. We can also arrange for mentors to review your images and suggest wavs thev can be improved.

The NVPS Mentor Program will continue along the lines of its current structure with Bill Millhouser and Stan Bysshe as co-managers. Given that NVPS meetings and most other Club activities will be virtual in nature rather than in-person this Fall, we will rely on the use of online tools such as Zoom or Face Time to facilitate the mentoring process.

Camera Insurance

Most of us have a substantial investment in our camera equipment. A camera body plus a few lenses, filters, and a tripod can quickly add up to several thousands of dollars. Replacing equipment lost by theft or damage can be very expensive. How do you protect your equipment from loss or damage? Do you or should you carry insurance on your camera equipment?

Insurance is a means of protection from financial loss. It is a form of risk management, primarily used to hedge against the risk of a contingent or uncertain loss.

Homeowner and renter insurance policies covers loss due to theft, fire, water damage and other risks. Car insurance may also cover some losses. These types of policies normally have some type of deductible. If you have a \$500 deductible and lose a \$1,000 lens the insurance company may only reimburse you \$500. This does not take into depreciation on the equipment. If, for example, the equipment is several years old the insurance company may only compensate you \$200. Insurance companies may offer you full replacement cost coverage. Of course you will pay a premium for full replacement cost coverage. However, homeowner, renter and car insurance normally don't cover equipment damage, such as damaging a lens by dropping it.

Insurance companies usually permit you to put camera equipment and other valuable items on a "rider" or "schedule". For example, you may want to insure family vintage jewelry. The schedule lists the specific items you want to insure. The insurance will usually want you to provide information such as serial numbers and original invoices. You can add or remove equipment over time. You will pay a premium for this schedule coverage.

Insurance companies may also want to know if you use your equipment to generate revenue. In this case premiums could be higher or you may need a different type of policy. Only your insurance company knows.

An alternative to using your homeowner, rental or car insurance is to get coverage from a photography organization where you are a member. NANPA, North American Nature Photography Association offers insurance coverage.

Please be aware insurance companies are in business to make money. Like other NVPS members I've heard from I've needed to make several claims for lost or damaged equipment. I've had the insurance company actually replace the equipment or send me money. I recently dropped and damaged a lens costing around \$1,200. I put in a claim over the phone and was sent money to buy a new lens. I purchased the lens and sent my insurance company a request to remove the old lens from my schedule and add the new one. They refused to add the new lens, as this was my second claim in the last three years. They told me I could add new equipment until about 2022.

And don't forget about protecting your image processing equipment – your desktop computer, monitor, laptop, external disk drives and network-attached storage. Like cameras and lenses this equipment is not cheap. Homeowner's policies will cover some losses but you should check with your insurance company.

Last, but no less important, you have a big investment in your images. Remember to periodically and regularly backup your images.

In summary:

- Keep an inventory of your equipment with equipment name, purchase date, purchase cost
- Keep equipment receipts
- Understand what your insurance policy covers and does not cover
- Backup disk regularly
- The unexpected happens so be prepared before the fact

Photography Close to Home

The DMV – Washington, Maryland, Virginia – region has a wealth of interesting places to visit and photograph. Some are well know to most everyone while others are hidden gems. Long time NVPS members are familiar with many places while members new to the region like to get our and explore.

Starting with this issue of FotoFax we will be featuring a "special place" you may want to explore. In past some of the places have been destinations for an NVPS Field Trip while others are regular stomping grounds for members.

This month David L. Crooks, a member of the NVPS web team, shares one of his favorite places – Huntley Meadows Park in Alexandria.



Huntley Meadows Park is one of my most favorite places to visit and photograph as the variety of wildlife is amazing. Located in Alexandria, Virginia, Huntley Meadows Park is the largest park operated by the Fairfax County Park Authority with 1,452 acres (588 ha). There over 10 miles (16 km) of maintained and informal trails. I begin my visit at Huntley Meadows from the Lockheed Drive entrance. It starts with a great forest with ferns and nesting birds to the boardwalk. This boardwalk allows

you to walk out into the marsh area to see deer, foxes, many types of frogs, snakes, and varying sizes of turtles including snapping turtles (Chelydra serpentina) that are over 12 inches (30.48 cm) in diameter. I have spent many hours watching a variety of birds like Great Blue Herons, Little Blue Herons, Green Herons, Great Egrets, Snowy Egrets, Red-Winged Blackbirds, several types of sparrows, warblers, swallows, and ducks like Wood Ducks, Northern Pintail, and Northern Shovelers.

There is another entrance on the other side of the park called "Hike and Bike Trail" which starts at S. Kings Highway parking lot near Telegraph Road. From this parking lot, the trail takes you through the meadows for 1.2 miles (1.93 km) to arrive at the observation deck that overlooks the wetlands. Also, in the 2017-2018 Year, I won first place for a photo of a sunset at Huntley Meadows Park shown below.
