February 2, 2021 – Colleen Miniuk– *The Joy of Little Things: Macro Photography*




Collen Miniuk will talk at our February meeting about: *The Joy of the Little Things: Macro Photography*.

Education& Training

December 15, 2020 - Bill Corbett - Bird Photography

Bill Corbett will be our December Education & Training presenter talking about *Bird Photography*. Bird photography is for everyone interested in the wildlife, beauty, and light that can be found just outside your kitchen window or far beyond. Bill's presentation will detail photography of birds at rest and in flight. His talk is geared to all levels of interest and photography expertise - from beginner to advanced.

Bill's illustrated presentation will cover five topics: Equipment, Exposure, Autofocus, Craft, and Setups. Each will be discussed in terms of the basics and how to move up a learning curve.

- **Equipment**: From using a point and shoot superzoom to handling big glass on a gimbal head.
- **Exposure**: Three words -- Shoot in manual. Three more words -- Expose for highlights.
- **Autofocus**: Luck favors the prepared. "Spray and pray" favors those who know and use various features offered by their camera's autofocus.
- Craft: "Sun and wind behind" is one of a number of well-known strategies for bird photographers to arrive at better opportunities, and to come away with better images.
- **Setups**: Feeders + flashes = fun.

January 12, 2021 – Mike Whalen – Abstract Photography

Most photography is based on capturing real, easily recognizable subjects such as a persons, places, or things. Abstract photography is different. It focuses on finding simple elements such as shapes, forms, lines, textures, tones, patterns, and colors. These elements can be found everywhere, and typically, can be small visual pieces of physical objects. Distortions from reflections or looking thru textured glass can also produce interesting abstract effects.



This presentation will show examples of abstract and semi-abstract images and how they were created, mostly in-camera, plus a few generated from post-processing in Photoshop.

These references provide tips on creating abstract images:

- Abstract Photography for Beginners: 9 Tips for Capturing Stunning Abstract Images
- 35 Abstract Photography Tips and Ideas
- The Complete Guide to Abstract Photography: 112 Tips

As a teen, Mike learned a few basic photo tips from his father, an artist and photographer. He dabbled with film cameras in the 80's and 90's, and after that, played with several digital point-and-shoots. However, his interest became more passionate after purchasing a basic DSLR in 2006.

Mike joined NVPS in 2009 after learning about the club from fellow member, Willa Friedman. He held board positions from 2010 to the present, including President in 2013. He received several distinguished service awards and many competition awards thru the years.

Before COVID, Mike volunteered weekly as a pet photographer for the Fairfax County Animal Shelter and, and as an event photographer for charitable organizations such as: The National Ovarian Cancer Coalition and The Epilepsy Foundation of America.

Mike says that joining NVPS was a most important step in furthering his love of photography.



December 22, 2020 - Print – Judy Graham – Memories of Greenland



Judy Graham, one of NVPS's VP for Programs, has been fortunate to do some amazing things in her life, but the week she spent in Greenland aboard the 100-foot schooner, the Opal, remains one at the top of her list. Judy's member's Gallery presentation is a compilation of photos taken on her journey around Scoresby Sound, located on the eastern side of Greenland above the Arctic Circle. Her photos also include a stop at a Greenlandic

Inuit village, Ittoqqortoomitt, inhabited by approximately 400 residents and 250 sled dogs. Hunting whales, polar bears, seals, and musk ox (related to the goat) is still a way of life in this village, one of the most remote in the country.

Judy has lived in the Washington, D.C. area most of her life. She retired March 1, 2018 after a long career in the field of human resources management for corporate America. Judy joined NVPS in January 2011 with the goal of meeting local photographers, doing more local photography, and learning more about the art of photography. Her goals have been met 10 times over!

Judy is primarily drawn to photographing dramatic landscapes, often remote and difficult to get to. Initially her interest was in the desert southwest; however, in more recent years she has expanded her travel to include colder places such as Alaska, Patagonia, Iceland, Greenland, and the Canadian Rockies in winter. She does not let the cold get in her way.

Judy currently shoots with a Canon 5D MK IV. For most of the photos in her presentation she used a Canon 100-400mmL II lens and had to handhold due to the motion of the boat. For those who know her, she is glued to her trusty tripod.

As for the future, she has a trip planned to the Tetons in September 2020 and one to Arizona in November 2020. She is the happy holder of a permit to the Wave (North Coyote Buttes). Beyond that she has no idea.

He has been a member of NVPS for only one year but has enjoyed meeting some



Artist Statement is your opportunity to engage and enlighten the viewer, and to offer insight into the portfolio through a description of the subject matter and why it is important to you.

An Artist Statement is not a biography, a list of accomplishments or a catalogue of works. Remember that brevity is the soul of wit; we recommend that your Artist Statement be no more than 100 words.

The Portfolio Gallery at the NVPS website is a great place to read Artist Statements from past years to get a feel for how they are constructed. Another good resource is the article in Lenswork issue #103, Nov-Dec 2012 found on the NVPS website on the Portfolio Project Page and at Writing an Artist's Statement.

Photography Close to Home

Shooting Birds from a Kayak by Michele Dandrea Lowell

If you are a bird photographer, getting out on the water offers lots of great photo opportunities. Fortunately, there are plenty of places to rent kayaks. The purchase of inflatable kayaks this past spring resulted in some great times for my family during this most notorious year. Being outside, getting exercise on the water while enjoying the beauty and wildlife nurtured our souls, energized our bodies and lifted our spirits. I carried my camera and one or two lens in a dry bag fastened to the kayak for safety.

Wading birds like herons and egrets along with predators like osprey and bald eagles hunt and nest along waterways where you can't always access on foot. Bald eagles and ospreys tend to roost in trees at the water's edge either resting between hunts, eating or protecting their territory. Opportunities abound for ducks and double breasted cormorants out on the water as well. With practice, you can learn to anticipate their takes offs and landings to get a good shot.

Kayaking allows you to quietly approach the bird as well as adjust your location for best light and composition. Sitting at water level gives you an eye level perspective when they are wading, landing, hunting or swimming. If you are lucky you'll find an active nest and eagles and osprey couples tend to return to the same nests each year.

It is a balancing act to get close enough for the shot but not too close as birds scare off easily. If you see them looking at you, back off. Just like you should not walk

straight toward a bird, neither should you paddle straight toward them if you can help it. I prefer a 500mm lens (Nikon 500mm F5.6) for shooting birds out on the water as it allows you some great magnification at distance. I have found that once the larger birds like a heron fill my frame, I am typically as close as the most tolerant will allow. Most will not let you get that close. Even eagles and ospreys safely high up in a tree will fly off quickly. I have not had much luck adding a 1.4x extender to my 500mm lens due to boat movement making focusing and framing difficult. Shooting at 1000th of a second and higher will yield the best results if you are trying to stop the action.

If you can go out with a partner in a tandem kayak you can take turns keeping the boat in position while the other shoots. Or if you are super lucky you have a spouse or partner who will control the kayak from the back while you shoot to your heart's content in the front.

I have 3 favorite places to share for the purpose of shooting birds from a kayak. All 3 have rentals available when in season. All three are best when the tide is on the high side.

Mason Neck State Park is in Lorton, VA on Belmont Bay off the Potomac River. It is pretty much a slam dunk for bald eagle sightings. If you turn right from the launch and go into Kane's Creek you'll eventually come to an eagle's nest on the left bank. As recently as last week, the adult pair were roosting together in a tree. Earlier this summer I saw one juvenile near the nest.

Pohick Bay Regional Park is also in Lorton not far from Mason Neck on the Pohick Bay off the Potomac River. Bearing left from the launch will take you to some narrow, shallower grassy areas toward Pohick Creek. This is an opportunity to photograph wading Great Blue Herons and Great Egrets as well as Double Crested Cormorants in action. Eagles and ospreys can often be found in the trees.

A hidden gem is Featherstone National Wildlife Refuge in the vicinity of Leesylvania State Park in Woodbridge, VA. It is currently only accessible by small craft. It is on the Occoquan Bay off the Potomac River. To access it, rent or launch your kayak from Hampton's Landing Boat Marina on Neabsco Creek. You can also access it from Leesylvania State Park but it is a longer paddle. An osprey nest is just off the Hampton's Landing dock on a piling that you'll pass as you exit the launch dock. When active, you have ample opportunities to catch them in action. There was nesting activity this summer, there may have been babies but I never laid eyes on them.

Exiting the Hampton's Landing boat launch head right. Next, paddle under the train trestle then bear left and follow the water's edge up the bay. Look for a left into Farm Creek, ideally carry a map or look on your phone navigation as it is not easy to find the first time. The tide and amount of grasses will determine how far you can go up Farm Creek. Only once, so far, have we been able to go all the way through Farm

Creek thanks to high tide during late autumn after the grasses had died back. It is a beautiful paddle up Farm Creek which you typically have all to yourself. There is a noisy Great Blue Heron rookery that you'll hear long before you see it. You'll see cormorants, bald eagles and ospreys. Winter brings in the ducks and you will notice a few freshly adorned blinds which the ducks smartly avoid.

If it is too windy to head out past the train trestle, make a left from the marina and explore Neabsco Creek. There are lots of grasses, calm water, muskrat dens and the whole host of birds to shoot. If the tide is high enough you can make it to the Julie J. Metz Neabsco Creek Boardwalk which is a worthy destination on its own.

I hope this helps give you some ideas and encouragement to get out on the water, away from crowds and enjoy the beautiful bays and waterways we have so close to us.

NVPS Website Changes

Mike Whalen and the NVPS Web Team have been busy making improvements to the NVPS website – NVPS.ORG. Recently they made two changes to the NVPS Galleries folder structure. The gallery can be found at: <a href="https://www.nvPS.com/nvPS.c

1. The team merged the archived galleries (also known as **Older Galleries**) into their respective folder's current galleries. For example, now there is only a single "Portfolio Project" gallery that has both new and older portfolios in one place (2008-2020, <u>Portfolio Project</u>). The same is true for the Monthly Competitions and Field Trip galleries. Also note that the menu item **Older Galleries** no longer exists in either the website or gallery menus.

The rationale for making this change was to simplify the gallery structure and to make the superb images in the older galleries easier to reach. Also, since all the
