ith her first Olympus film camera, Suzy McIntire took all the photos for her 2002 garden book, "An American Cutting Garden." For many years at the Natural History Museum she photographed small fossils for researchers and the collections database. Using a microscope, scientific camera, and software for extended depth of field photos, these images were composites sometimes of as many as 25 pictures. She once was asked to photograph what a museum visitor claimed was a "fossil apple." This visitor planned to sell it to Apple for a million dollars to fund his retirement. (A paleontologist had to

# Introduction to Lightroom Library Filters

he Adobe Lightroom (LR) Library Module has an amazingly useful filter capability that I encourage you to explore. The filter features allows you to sort images by Text, Attribute, and Metadata, but I will only address the Metadata filter in this article. Why would you want to filter your images based on metadata?

- ▶ To determine which lens you use least often (time to trade or sell?)
- To see what aperture is giving the best portrait bokeh
- ► To see how a new lens performs at different focal lengths and apertures, and how it compares to your old lens
- To see what ISO setting is beginning to create more noise in your image
- To compare the results with the same camera from one photo event to another to analyze what worked best and to grow your photographic skill
- ► To review the image results of that telephoto 1.5 extender against the non-extended lens

The Metadata filter provides image sorts on up to four metadata elements by default, expandable to more, if needed. Some elements are automatically stored upon file import and some are updated as you process the files. This gives you many ways to review your work and potentially improve your photography.


The Filter Bar sits on top of the Library thumbnails when in Grid mode. If missing, just press the backslash key ("\") to see it. "None" will show the active highlight.




Click on "Metadata" and the screen will expand showing the four default columns. Note that the population included in the filter function depends on the active catalog element—it can be a single or multiple folders, or every image in the catalog if the "All Photographs" at the top level is active.

### (Guest Article continued)

The four columns of Metadata headings may show a default or may be blank, but hover over any one and up/down arrows appear. Click on the symbol and a menu drops down listing all the available metadata elements. The "camera/exposure" element series (camera, shutter speed etc.) are really useful for critical review of the work because all four columns of elements can be linked.



For example, I'm interested in my photos taken with a specialty lens, the Leica/Panasonic 100–400mm f4-6.3. On the first column (on the left) I select lens, then the 100–400mm. There are 1,123 images taken with this lens when "All Photographs" is active. In the second column I select shutter speed and the sort of the same population of 1,123 images arrays all the shutter speeds used. Similarly, I selected Focal Length and Aperture for columns three and four. Note that columns two, three, and four, default to the "All" summary initially, and you then select any subset you want.



To check on focus performance perhaps select on maximum focal lengths at different shutter speeds and apertures. To check on diffraction effects with this telephoto lens, filter on all shutter speeds, focal lengths from 200–400mm, and apertures from wide open to maximum shut down.

The data base sorts are there to answer questions, and many don't require all the columns to interact. (To zero out a column select "None" at the bottom of the options.)

What other questions might you want to answer by filtering on Metadata? Can I really hold the camera still at 1/15 sec? Did my last bird outing have better focus success at "x" settings or "y" settings? How are my street settings of 1/160, f5.6 and auto ISO working? How does my full frame compare to my APC–C camera output from my Africa trip? Can I can sort on aspect ratio and rating to reduce the search for the perfect landscape orientation shot?

In summary, this is just an orientation to the Metadata filter in LR. To further explore the LR Library Filters, I'd suggest this Scott Davenport posting titled "Explore Your Photo Trends with the Library Filters in Lightroom."

# April 15, 2023

# Hillwood Estate, Museum, and Gardens 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. (rain date April 16)

t is our pleasure to introduce April's field trip to the Hillwood Estate, Museum, and Gardens. This is a rare destination for our club to explore. The estate is huge and we may not cover it all in one visit, but we're certain you will end the day satisfied, already planning your next visit.

The former owner, Marjorie Merriweather Post, maintained an extensive collection of orchids, so a visit to the greenhouse to see the orchids and other flowers maintained by today's horticulturists is sure to be impressive. Spring will be well underway and the Japanese style garden will be amazing, despite the fact that the cherry blossoms will have passed their prime. The Lunar Lawn will also draw in photographers with rows of flowers lining the perimeter. You can discover sculptures and other subjects while wandering around the French Parterre and Four Seasons garden.

There is so much to see outdoors that you may forget about the lavishly decorated mansion and museum. Inside you can tour the mansion's collection of Imperial—era Russian art. You'll also find exotic French furniture, tapestries, and paintings as you wander through the rooms of the mansion.

On the day of our field trip we'll start with the outdoors. After we've paid our admission, we'll break into smaller groups and spread out to the various gardens to take advantage of the soft morning light. Around 12:00 p.m. we'll gather around the Merriweather Cafe for a break. They will have indoor dining as well as a to—go menu which will allow us to eat and chat outside in the warm spring weather. The light may be a bit harsh after our break, so we recommend going indoors to scope out subjects.

Please be aware of <u>Hillwood's photography policy</u> which states that tripods may only be used in the gardens—flashes, reflectors, etc. are prohibited.

### Tickets:

- Visiting Hillwood requires paid admission.
   <u>Tickets can be purchased ahead of time</u>
   online (\$1 discount) or in person.
- ► Tickets are \$18 adult, \$15 senior, and child (6-8) \$6

### **Equipment:**

- Most subjects will not be too far away so a standard lens will suit for most compositions.
- Consider bringing a macro lens to capture some unique details in either the flowers or decorations.
- Don't forget to bring a polarizer.
