





Tone Theory—The Principles of Tone



His passion for art shifted when he finally decided to double down on his love for the American landscape. In 2006 Blake took up photography, but he incorporates his knowledge of aesthetics and color theory into his photography courses and is known for his acclaimed Photoshop® workflow.

Blake is a self–published author and has worked as an independent photo educator for many software companies. Some of his partnerships include Topaz Labs, Plotagraph Pro, and ON1. Throughout his teaching efforts at <u>f.64 Academy</u>, Blake has helped hundreds of thousands of photographers excel in their post–processing endeavors. He hosts Photoshop Tips, courses, monthly critiques, and live events on his <u>f.64 Elite</u> monthly membership website.

Blake's presentation is "Tone Theory—The Principles of Tone." He says, "You've seen them, those images that make your jaw drop and leave you speechless. They pull you in, you are captivated by them, and you can't stop looking at them. They leave a plethora of emotions swirling around in your brain and you just can't stop thinking about them." But then, you look through your portfolio and wonder, "Why don't my images have that same feeling? Why doesn't passion resonate in my photos?"

The truth is that most people run toward color and over–saturation to try to achieve the same mood. Color Theory is definitely powerful and knowing it can help you transform your images. But there is something even more important that sets the stage for your colors—your tones! In this presentation Blake is going to introduce you to his Tone Theories. After this you will be able to look at an image and see almost immediately why it works or doesn't based on tones alone.

He enjoys nature and travel photography, particularly when friends are involved, and occasionally experiments with other genres.

Jim will share lessons he's learned in planning his photography trips and hauling photography equipment all over the world by land, sea, and air. Much of this amounts to common sense, but can be easily overlooked, some will be less obvious, and some will reflect hard-won experience. Still Life—The Beginning of my Photography Journey

y name is Catherine. I'm an amateur photographer based in Northern Virginia and a member of NVPS since 2021. Although I have always been passionate about photography, it wasn't until I picked up my first DSLR camera in 2016 that I realized I had a talent for capturing beautiful moments. At first my main goal was to take pictures of my children to document their growth. However, with a full-time job as a Senior Software Engineer and a busy family life, I didn't have much time to dive into photography.

In my spare time I love to experiment with different types of photography, including still life, portrait, and architecture. It wasn't until Covid–19 hit in 2020 that I had more time to focus on photography and improve my skills. I wanted to step up my game and showcase my work on a more professional platform like 1X.com. Despite being an amateur, I worked hard to improve my skills and establish my foundation in different photography styles.

During quarantine I devoted myself to still life photography. Although quarantine caused many issues in society, it ultimately allowed me to appreciate nature's beauty and the delicate art of photography. My still life photography journey began with high–key photography inspired by Mandy Disher's high–key flower photos. After several attempts I created my first high–key photo called "Spring" and published it on 1X. I continued to experiment with different flowers, compositions, and colors to create visually stunning high–key flower photos. Here are some of my favorite high–key still life images:

Then I moved on to classic still life photos. I always choose a subject that inspires me and carefully consider the composition, lighting, angles, and props to create a visually compelling image. Experimenting with different camera settings and techniques, such as depth of field and shutter speed,

allows me to create different effects and moods in my photos. Over time, I developed skills and created still life photographs that capture the beauty and essence of the subject. I also became an antique shopper and always searched for unique objects to include in my still life images. Here are some of my favorite classic still life photos:

After two years of practice, I wanted to take my still life photography to the next level by using light painting techniques. Light painting involves using a handheld light source to selectively illuminate different parts of the scene during a long exposure. This technique allows me to create beautiful and surreal effects that add a sense of mystery and intrigue to my still life photos. With practice and experimentation, I created stunning light painting still life images that are visually striking and unique. I was honored to receive recognition for my work, including being shortlisted for the Sony World Photography Awards 2023 in the Alpha Female Awards and Open Competition (Object). Revolutionary War Weekend at Mount Vernon

9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (rain date May 7)

t's another British invasion. This time it's centered at Washington's Mount Vernon and it involves highly enthusiastic historical reenactors instead of a rock band. We'll visit Mount Vernon during their Revolutionary War Weekend. This is a large event hosting hundreds of reenactors and has become very popular. Tickets will sell out well in advance.

We'll hope for the best possible weather as we plan to attend Saturday morning. If you cannot secure Saturday tickets, you may want to consider attending Sunday instead. This is an awesome event for any history buff and photographer interested in portraits, candids, and historically accurate journalistic compositions. There is so much to see and the cast members are photo friendly.

The schedule of events for the day is not published until the "generals" meet, usually the morning of the event. Camp life is demonstrated throughout the day and there is always something happening. Use your eyes and ears to anticipate unique opportunities so you can be at the right place at the right time. Troop inspection usually occurs around 10 a.m. and will be announced over the PA system. Pick your side and stick with it. In the past there have been two scheduled skirmishes, one around 12:00 p.m. and another around 2:00 p.m. Skirmishes are dependent on the weather as they will be using real muskets and gunpowder.

Most participants are photogenic and welcome the opportunity to be photographed, provided they're not busy. Approach with a smile and curiosity and you may find yourself much smarter after the encounter. The cast is very knowledgeable about their uniforms, their unit, and their camp.



We'll start our tour from the Ford Orientation Center (aka visitor's center). We'll leave the visitor's center and follow the path leading towards the Continental Army encampment which is usually found on the lawn beyond the Bowling Green. The British and Hessian camps are usually located on the back lawn (river side) behind the upper garden. Families (yes, actual wives and children) of the soldiers often accompany the reenactors just like camp followers would have in the past and they even play their historical rolls as well.

It won't take long for many of us to become separated, engrossed in whatever catches our eye. This is certainly anticipated though we encourage staying in small groups while you tour. We'll wander around from tent to tent, capture scenes and events, and find groups of soldiers marching or otherwise preparing for the day.

Our groups will most likely react to events announced over the PA. Everything is a short walk, but you're not going to see everything

as some events overlap. We recommend finding something and following the action for a while before moving on. Some events like the skirmishes may require you to plan ahead and stake out a spot before the crowds overtake the venue. Knowing the contour of the land, having a bit of luck, and getting a hint about the planned skirmish will help you find the right spot.

Please be aware of Mount Vernon's code of conduct which includes their photography policy. No flash photography is allowed indoors and tripods are prohibited, despite the fact that events such as Mount Vernon fireworks displays have allowed tripods outdoors in the past.

Tickets:

- Mount Vernon's Revolutionary War Weekend is a ticketed event. Your ticket gives you access to all events for the day as well as general admission to Mount Vernon including an optional tour of the mansion.
- This is a popular event, so we recommend you <u>purchase your tickets online</u> well in advance.
- Tickets cost \$35 for adults and \$21 for youth.

Equipment:

- You will have the opportunity to get up close and talk with the event participants. A standard lens (about 24-70mm) will cover most of the images you'll capture walking around the camps.
- Weather permitting, there will be multiple mock skirmishes with musket and cannon fire. For these events, you will be required to stand behind roped—off viewing areas. For this reason be sure to bring a telephoto lens. A 200mm will give you a wide shot of the "battlefield." You will need at least a 300mm to isolate individuals.

- Always bring a polarizer.
- No flash photography is permitted in the mansion or galleries.
- Tripods are also prohibited. You shouldn't need your tripod anyway. Save yourself the weight and leave it at home.
- ▶ Weather is anticipated to be warm. Bring a hat and sunscreen to protect yourself from the afternoon sun. You may also want to bring a small bottle of water. Restrooms are available onsite. Benches are available but are spread around the grounds and always busy. There is seating on the back porch of the mansion for anyone who wants an extended break to enjoy the late spring breeze in the shade.
