MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR





Cat also is an active member and chair for the North Bethesda Camera Club, is a liaison for NBCC's high school outreach program, and volunteers with the Potomac Community Resources offering photo critique for teens and adults with developmental differences. Since its conception in 1839, photography has experienced a continual shift in process and functionality. The evolution of the medium has brought us to our current shoreline of artistic definition where we not only can make stunning photographic art, but also conceptualize ideas and convey meaning within photographs in unique ways.

eggy Feerick has taught photography for over 40 years and is currently instructing classes for The Smithsonian Associates Studio Arts Program. She retired from George Mason University as Associate Professor and Coordinator of Photography in 2016, with prior teaching at various institutions including the University of New Mexico, Georgetown University, and the University of Pennsylvania. In addition, she was the photo archivist and curator for the Smithsonian's Archives of American Art photographic collection from 1988 to 1994.

She has served as a lecturer, moderator, and conference panelist both locally and nationally. In 1998, she co-authored an article on "Women in Photography" for The Reader's Companion to U.S. Women's History. In 1993, she curated "The Telling Image: Portrait Photographs from the Archives of American Art." This exhibition was shown at the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery, Washington, DC, and later traveled to New York City.

Feerick 's work is mainly photographic in nature but at times includes the mediums of printmaking and sculpture. Her work is exhibited locally and nationally, and is represented in both private and public collections. Peggy has received several grants and awards, including a residency at CREAR in Scotland and George Mason's Mathy Award. She holds a BFA from Rochester Institute of Technology in Photography, and MA and MFA in Photography and Art History from the University of New Mexico.





NOVEMBER 14 (IN PERSON) Jim Norman Photography and the Law

im is a long–time member of NVPS and other organizations with an interest in photography, including being a Creator Member of the Copyright Alliance.

This presentation will focus on two topics of importance to photographers—an introduction to copyright and a discussion of limitations that can be placed on where and when you can take a photograph and the uses you can make of that photograph.



Copyright is controlled exclusively by Federal law and provides important protections—and limitations—to you as the creator of a photograph. You automatically own the copyright in a photograph you make for your own use (if you're employed by someone else, other factors come into play), but once you share a photograph, things become more complicated. In addition, your rights and remedies change significantly if you take the time to file a copyright registration. In some instances, it may be worthwhile to take legal action against a party that has made unauthorized use of one of your images. In addition to the more complicated remedies available in the past, we now have a less complex, and less expensive, option—the Copyright Claims Board. We will also touch upon the "fair use" exceptions and the complications that can arise if you employ artificial intelligence to make or enhance an image.



Limitations of when and where you can take a photograph, and how you can use it, will vary considerably depending on circumstances. We'll go over the factors you need to take into account, and what your options are, if someone tells you "you aren't allowed" to make photos of a particular scene. It can be complicated, and often the best option is to use common sense and common courtesy, regardless of what you have the "right" to do. Jim is a Creator Member of the Copyright Alliance and will discuss copyrights as they relate to photographers.

hotography is David Crooks' passion and capturing the beauty of nature is the reward. David pursues his love of photography from his early days of chasing cardinals in his neighborhood to visiting many local and faraway parks, reserves, and other places where "wildlife" can be found.

In 2014, David, his wife Cynthia, and their dog Sam, moved to Annandale from Leesburg to be closer to work. He was a member of the Loudoun Photo Club for about 5 years and then in 2015 he joined the Northern Virginia Photographic Society (NVPS). In 2016, he volunteered to be the Webmaster of the NVPS website.

David is also the organizer of the Virginia Beltway Photography

<u>Meetup Group</u> which has over 2,700 members and leads about four to five field trips a month. The Group also does a Photo A Day for the year and a month project. The goal is to take photos every day and post the best one to the Meetup site. This is a proven way

to improve your photography. In 2021, David wrote the <u>Virginia Beltway Photography Meetup Group</u> <u>Guide Book</u>. It is available at Amazon in Kindle version for \$9.99 and paperback for \$15.99. David is an affiliate of Skylum and has done a few of these live edit sessions for the Meetup Group. He has a discount code and affiliate links. He receives a small commission on the sale, but this does not increase the price.

Interested in the latest in Artificial Intelligence (AI) and how it has shaken up photography? David will present a 30,000–foot view of AI and demonstrate examples of AI that are currently in use in photography software editing programs. He will demonstrate Photoshop's Generative Fill and Generative Expand tools, and Luminar Neo's newest AI tools, GenErase, SceneExpand, and SceneSwap.

Suzy McIntire Photographing from a Train

his past year I've enjoyed taking photographs from trains. Many subjects of interest are much closer to trains than they are to highways, and many railroad bridges have few barriers to get in the way of photos. A train's higher vantage point makes for unusual shots, too, especially when there's no other access to get the photo. I particularly like an image where something at a distance is in focus, but foreground vegetation is blurred.

Key to photographing from trains is getting a good window. For that, the free Red Caps are invaluable! For a \$5–10 tip, they will take you to the train before other riders can board, as much as 20–30 minutes earlier for a train originating at the station. Otherwise, it can be hard to get a window at all on a busy route. Choose a seat for the quality of the window-be able to shoot back as well as forward, without a bar in the middle. not mud splashed. If there's a choice between higher and lower-level seating, the higher windows should be cleaner.

Most importantly, to cut window glare, sit on the side of the train the sun will NOT be shining on. (On cloudy days perhaps take the opportunity to sit on the glare side.)

Use a silicone lens hood (such as the <u>Ultimate Lens Hood</u>) to block out reflections, and keep the lens close to the glass (but not touching). If you're in a sleeper, turn off the lights. Wear dark clothes so you don't contribute to reflections, and if needed, throw a dark jacket over the seat hardware that reflects. You could even place dark tape over the silver top front of your camera body, although I don't. Observation cars are the worst for unwanted reflections. Other places to go are the cafe car or the exit doors with big windows.

Bring a tiny kit to clean the window inside and out. Depending on platform height, you may not be able to reach the window at one station, but can at the next. However, many times you can't clean the window and using a wide aperture helps decrease visibility of window dirt. Don't despair over dirt—it's usually fixable in post–processing.

If there's heavy vegetation along the track such as the train to Harper's Ferry, leave your camera set on the exposure conditions you're hoping will reappear.

Most of my pictures were taken between 18mm and 50mm focal length. Depending on train velocity, use shutter speeds of 1000 to 1500. To get those shutter speeds you may need a fairly





high ISO, often 1500 and higher. Use continuous focus with burst if your camera allows it. Bring a fast lens because if the day is at all cloudy, it can be difficult to get a fast shutter and useful depth of field. Train speed is highly variable. It's difficult later, when looking at pictures, to know what setting worked best because there's little way to remember how fast the train was going for any particular picture. I also don't take the Acela train because I don't want fast.

Objects closer to the train move by faster and are harder to get in focus than those further away. Don't use single-point focus—use your equivalent of "zone." At high train speeds, I position the camera and keep one eye on the window to see what's coming and the other on the screen or viewfinder. Sometimes both eyes are on the window—with the camera leveled, click away. I delete most of the pictures I take!

Depending on your camera (I use Fuji), the electronic shutter may produce distorted images with fast–moving subjects and you'll want to use the mechanical shutter instead. At slow train speeds you can also try reverse panning.

Often, it's not possible to capture wanted scenes because they are gone by the time you press the shutter, but if you keep shooting, you'll find gems you didn't know were coming. If you don't have the camera already raised in position at the window, you will miss the picture. Have a trigger finger—click, click, click—and delete later. Bring several batteries, because the trigger finger means you will take excessive photos, but turning off the camera means you will miss the picture entirely.





NOVEMBER 11, 2023 (IN PERSON) **Manassas Battlefield Park** 4:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. (rain date November 12)

oin us for an evening and sunset at the Manassas Battlefield Park. The park offers lots of photographic opportunities that are scattered around the 5000-acre park. We recommend you begin your tour at one of the several parking lots accessible from Route 29 which runs through the park. Start at either end of the park. In the east, you'll find the Stone Bridge, and in the west, there's Battery Heights and Stonewall Memory Gardens including water features.

After composing shots from your first late afternoon destination, hop back in your chariot and move on to the next parking lot which might put you near the Groveton Cemetery or the Stone House. If it's particularly dark or cars are whizzing by with their lights on, head up to the 14th Brooklyn Monument where you can see the road from a hilltop and capture the lights streaks.

Early November in Virginia should be peak fall foliage season so many of the trees surrounding the park will be well into or slightly past their peak. When you're done composing subjects around the battlefield, join us for our sunset meet and greet at the Henry Hill Visitor's Center. Normally, we meet up before we explore, but this time we're switching it around so we can be together to capture what we hope will be a spectacular sunset.

Points of Interest (organized east to west):

- Stone Bridge parking off Rte. 29 near (38.8249, -77.5013)
- Stone House parking east of corner with Rte. 29 and VA234 near (38.819, -77.525)
- Henry House, Henry Hill Visitor's Center, and nearby fields accessible off VA234
- Groveton Cemetery minimal parking off Rte. 29 near (38.8134, -77.5468)
- 14th Brooklyn Monument across street from Groveton Cemetery

- Stonewall Memory Gardens accessible off US 29 near VA234 intersection
- Battery Heights parking one mile away at Brawner Farm near (38.8139, -77.5695) or half a mile from Groveton.

When:

- Saturday, November 11, from 4:00 p.m. to
 6:30 p.m. (rain date November 12)
- Sunrise is at 6:46 a.m. EST and sunset is 4:57 p.m. EST

Equipment:

- Bring your landscape lenses, typically 24– 70mm and 70–200mm.
- Tripods are permitted and encouraged.
- Remember to bring a polarizer and a graduated ND filter so you can capture all the details in the land and sky in one shot without compromising on details. A neutral density filter may also come in handy around Stone Bridge or Memory Gardens as they both have water features.
- Weather will be temperate. The afternoon will start comfortably, but may turn cooler as the sun sets. Again, we're looking for clear horizons, high clouds, and perfect photogenic weather.
- The Henry Hill Visitor's Center is open until 5:00 p.m. and it has a bathroom in the basement.

Where:

- We're meeting near the end of our field trip instead of the start. Hopefully, you will have gotten several compositions before we meet up in the parking lot of the Henry Hill Visitor's Center for our usual socializing.
- We'll discuss the weather and the possibilities for a sunset. We'll also explore the nearby fields and decide whether we want to dine out in nearby Manassas. The group will meet outside the Henry Hill Visitor's Center at the front of the Thomas Jefferson memorial at the base of the stairs.
- We'll have our customary socializing and determine if weather permits a sunrise shot.
 We'll make any additional planning during this meeting.

Directions:
