Always Look Back!

everal years ago, when I worked for a trade association, the annual convention featured a speaker who was a photographer. I learned he had spoken several years before and had been so well received that he was invited back to talk to the audience of more than 500 members. I thought it somewhat strange as his photography expertise didn't seem to match the technical aspects of the association. That changed when I heard him speak on his topic—Always Look Back!

Using his profession of photography as a metaphor, he encouraged the audience to always have a goal, to move forward toward our objective, to get what we're aiming for. But he also said to occasionally look back, to see where we've come from, to see how the scene has changed, to reevaluate our perspective, and perhaps alter our journey.

Having never forgotten his comments and photographs as illustrations, I have always tried to remember to occasionally look behind me when taking pictures and have often found a totally different—and sometimes better—picture. Lighting can vary from direct to backlight or from bright to dark; distances vary from a panorama landscape to a missed close up.

I recall seeing some people appear unexpectedly down a pathway I was planning to photograph so I snapped a picture with them in it. Instinctively, I turned and saw a picture of two older people holding hands on their continued journey.

I was photographing a daylily in my backyard in bright sunlight with dark shadows as a background. I happened to turn and saw the tree leaves glowing in the back light of the sun with a branch of dogwood flowers turned translucent in the reverse sunlight.

I could go on with many other examples, but you get the idea. We should always look ahead as we move forward through life but occasionally look behind us: we may be surprised at what we see. Very surprised!

JANUARY 20 (IN PERSON)

National Gallery of Art

10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (no rain date)

he The National Gallery of Art provides a wonderful backdrop for capturing some unique images. Let's get inspired from our visit where we'll immerse ourselves in over 150,000 pieces of art while making some of our own. Though this field trip is not guaranteed to make you famous from the art you create, it is guaranteed to entertain you on what might otherwise be a boring winter day.

Besides the art exhibits, you will find lots of interesting subjects including architecture, lines, colors, shapes, and street photo ops of people admiring the art in the East Building. Unlike the modern architecture of the East Building, the West Building's neoclassical architecture provides a more traditional layout including two garden courts, a rotunda, and expansive hallways connecting them. While some museums are extremely difficult to work in, the National Gallery of Art offers a lot more space to spread out. That openness should make it easier to compose images to tell your story without annoying distractions.

If the weather is comfortably cool or the sun is just too nice to ignore, consider a visit to the Sculpture Garden which lies further West of the West Building. The outdoor exhibit opens at 11:00 a.m., and in the winter, the Smithsonian drains the fountain in the center and converts it to an ice rink (weather permitting). Also, outside and between the East and West Buildings you will find a cobblestone plaza with pyramidal skylights and a sunken fountain.

Equipment and Notes:

- You'll probably find a use for any glass you have, though most images will probably be captured with either a 24–70mm or 70–200mm.
- ► With the exception of some special exhibits, flash photography is permitted.
- Tripods and monopods are not permitted anywhere on the premises.
- ▶ Bags are subject for search upon entry.
- Weather won't be too much of a concern as we'll be spending most of our time indoors. Dress in layers and prepare to take one off for indoors.
- ► Though not part of our field trip, there are tours offered by the gallery at the top of the hour starting at 11:00 a.m. See their website for more.

Where:

- We'll start in the East Building because that's closest to street parking and we may want to minimize our exposure to the cold weather. We'll meet just inside on the ground floor where it's warm. As the creative juices start flowing and we run out of things to talk about, feel free to explore the building.
- We'll meet again in the concourse for lunch or a snack at 12:30 p.m. There are plenty of food and snack options downstairs and this will give us a break to sit and relax. While

- downstairs, be sure to visit the Multiverse (2008) which is the moving walkway lit up by tiny strips of LED lights.
- When we're ready for more, we have the option of returning to the East Building or moving on to the West Building for more subjects. You're welcome to stay as long as you like.

Directions:

- ▶ The National Gallery of Art is on The National Mall on the North East side. The East Building sits between 3rd and 4th St., NW. While there is what appears to be lots of free parking on Pennsylvania Ave. at the Capitol, those spots may be reserved and not available. Safer parking can be found in metered spots along The Mall and surrounding streets. There is also a garage on 6th Street just North of Pennsylvania Ave.
- ► The Smithsonian (blue, orange, silver lines) metro stop is a couple blocks away as is the Archives—Navy Memorial—Penn Quarter (yellow and green lines). Both are a short two block walk away. Try the Metro Trip Planner.
