

MESSAGE FROM THE EDITOR



Have you discovered, as have I, that the offerings for photography education have really exploded since the days of the Covid shutdown? The use and expansion of virtual programs, classes, instructors, collaborations, and recordings are offering photographers such a wealth of opportunities that didn't exist before the rise of Zoom and virtual learning.

In September, 2023, I addressed some virtual opportunities in my editor's message, such as Sharon Tenenbaum's weekly free one-hour "Talk and Learn" sessions at 1:00 p.m. on Tuesdays where Sharon critiques photos submitted by viewers on a different theme each week. She also spends a few minutes in these sessions demonstrating Photoshop techniques. Sharon's has been doing "Talk and Learn" since Covid arrived and has now done 180 sessions. Give it a try sometime—you have to sign up for each session on her <u>website</u>, but I know you'll learn new things.

If you registered for <u>Mid–Atlantic Photo Visions</u> 2023, you know that you can watch the recordings from the presentations as many times as you wish until May 31, 2024.

In the January 2023 edition of FotoFax, David Kravitz wrote an extensive guest article titled "Free Online Photography Education" which provided links to a gold mine of sources to improve your photography. This is a great reference tool.

I've also been watching collaborations between different photographers over Zoom which have been incredible such as Sharon Tenenbaum with French photographer David Duchens. In March Sharon Tenenbaum will present a collaboration with Angie McMonigal, our NVPS December program speaker and January judge, titled "<u>Two Visions of Architecture</u>." In these collaborations the artists show their "start to finish" photo processing, sharing their great artistry and techniques. These sessions are recorded and sent to each participant for further viewing, making them a valuable investment.

NVPS members also have access to recordings of speakers and presentations on the <u>NVPS Member's website</u>.

Finally, there is a wonderful opportunity coming up February 9–11 with the interactive conference "<u>Out of Chicago Live! 2024</u>." This conference has 100 sessions with over 50 world–class photographers (some of whom have spoken at MAPV or NVPS meetings), and each session is recorded and will be available for viewing for 12 months after the conference. I've got my ticket! I love learning new things. I find it keeps my creative juices flowing and my gray cells active.

Good luck to you as you pursue your creative passions in 2024!

FEBRUARY 6 (ZOOM) David Akoubian An Illustrator's View of Landscape Photography

avid started photographing in 1972, mainly as an aid for his illustrations and paintings of nature. He found that the rewards of photographing were better than drawing or painting, so he put down the pencils and brushes and continued with the camera and lens. In 1992 David decided to pursue photography as a profession. Since that date, in addition to photographing, he has taught classes and workshops around the US and Iceland. Currently he resides in the North Georgia Mountains in a place called Bear Woods. Many of the bird images he creates are in his backyard which is a certified wildlife sanctuary. David's work has appeared in many magazines and guide books, and he volunteers his time and

efforts to several conservation groups in Georgia and Wyoming. He is a Tamron Image Master, an f–stop Gear Pathfinder, and a Kase Filter Ambassador. David's website is <u>Bear Woods Photography</u>.

In this program you will learn how David approaches landscape photography, basing his compositions and vision from his days as an illustrator. He likes to use the same techniques that he used as a painter in his photography, such as incorporating elements to lead the viewer's eye through the frame. He feels the quality of the light is critical to capture his vision, and most of his images are done in a single frame simply


FEBRUARY 27—DIGITAL (IN PERSON) Jennifer Nguyen A Trip to Maine in the Fall Season

FEBRUARY 27 (IN PERSON) Alan Goldstein

Epic Journey 2.0—Around the US in 88 Days

n 2022, Alan and wife Marty traveled around the US in their 27–foot mobile home. The trip took 156 days and covered 18,602 miles. Alan shot 21,350 photos. This past summer, Alan and Marty decided to go on another trip. While a good portion was spent in Michigan with Marty's family, the rest was to visit those places the couple missed in 2022 as well as visiting the remainder of the lower 48 states.

This Member's Forum will show a small number of the more than 8,300 photos Alan shot during the nearly 10,000 miles of Epic Journey 2.0.

A member of NVPS since 2012, Alan has been involved in some way or other with photography for the past 56 years. It

all began with a science teacher instructing him on the art of film developing. At that time, he was using a Kodak Brownie. Veering off during his teenage years to using an 8mm movie camera, he returned to still photography during his college years and while working as a reporter for his hometown newspaper.

Alan was supposed to call in a newspaper photographer for photos, but she lived nearly 30 miles away, so he opted to take photos himself. At first, he used a Polaroid Type 103 for photos since it made instant, crisp pictures. But encouraged by a classmate and photographer, Alan got access to the college's darkroom and processed Tri–X each time

he had a news event or other photo request. This, plus being a radio disc jockey, probably contributed to his less–than–stellar GPA!

After graduating from college, Alan enlisted in the Navy, becoming a Navy Journalist and later a Public Affairs Officer.

His high school girlfriend had a Nikon SLR, and that became Alan's Holy Grail. As a low–ranking Navy man, Alan scraped up the money and bought his first true SLR—a Minolta SRT–101. As he progressed up the Navy ranks, he upgraded to a Minolta X700.

Fast forward to 2003. Alan's brother–in–law was getting married, and Alan was the photographer. An acquaintance who was a Nikon rep Ioaned Alan a D100. It was love at first click! Since then, Alan has had a D100, D200, D300, D800, D810, and for the past seven years, D850.

Alan considers himself an advanced amateur, even though he has made more than five figures making pictures. His biggest job was making progress photos of the deconstruction and reconstruction of the DC public library in Georgetown.

Retired from the Navy in 1994 and retired from Civil Service in 2011, Alan is happy to spend his time traveling and making images. He loves photographing just about everything but really likes night scenes and landscapes. His photos have been used for greeting cards by non–profits, for proposals by environmental entities, by sports web sites, have appeared in newspapers, and even hang in a gas station.

Alan was the FotoFax editor from 2014 to 2018. Alan says he loves being a member of NVPS. He has gained some great friends, enjoys the camaraderie, and has learned something new at nearly every meeting. Alan has been involved with photography for over 56 years. He really enjoys photographing night scenes and landscapes.

Deb Rose Telling Your Photo's Story—Blogging and Photography

"There is no greater agony than bearing an untold story inside you." *Maya Angelou*

y husband Art and I are passionate about travel photography. We love planning and finding our way to new places and experiences and capturing it through our cameras. As we devote more time to photography and travel to more epic places, our collection of travel photos is growing.

Looking back the through these photos, we realized a single picture would bring back a rush of memories around the surroundings and emotions from when it was captured. As we reminisced, we also realized there were often deeper stories behind the photos that were not being told by viewing just a single image. We set off to discover how we could merge our photos with words to tell a more complete story.

While we had a website to share photos with friends and family, it wasn't designed to accomplish what we were hoping to achieve as it was designed for photos only. We tried social media such as Facebook and Instagram, where we could write a bit about a photo, however that didn't fully meet our needs either. The larger story was often missing within a single post, and there was no guarantee anyone who was interested could easily find it.

After some research, including reading other blogs about travel photography that we found useful in our own travel planning, it became clear that blogging was the answer. We decided to re–develop our website to include a personal blog platform devoted to our travel and photography, where we would blend photos and storytelling.

Our research gave us some direction with key steps in developing a blog:

Decide on your reason for developing a blog. What is your why?

The first thing we agreed on was the purpose of our blog, a type of mission statement to guide and focus our content. Our goal wasn't to "capture clicks" or generate sales. We wanted to create an online "family room library," a collection of experiences and learnings where others could readily read and engage in our travel and photography adventures through our stories and photos. We also wanted to share our decision making, rich experiences, and the fun and challenges encountered during our travels with our camera gear. We hoped others would find the information helpful, if not motivating, for their own travels and photography. It would also provide an outlet for my creative writing, and I was excited to blend it with our photography.

What will you name your blog?

We elected to purchase domain names for our website and our blog. We already used Shorewoods Photography to watermark our photos, so we chose that as the name of our website and registered it as our main domain.

We then needed to come up with a name for our blog. While waiting in line for a flight, standing near the Boarding Group 2 sign, we joked that this would be a great name for our blog— especially since we wanted it to be about travel, and there were 2 of us! That is how Boarding Group 2 came to be. That domain name was available and we registered it as well.

Where will your blog be hosted?

Would a free or a paid site offer more of what you need? We decided to pay for an enhanced level on a hosted website that supports blogging. We tried the free version first to determine the ease for posting content, and whether the site was customizable in the way we needed. We did find there was a bit of a learning curve on how to direct the domain names to the hosted platform, and an even bigger learning on how to create web pages, blog posts, and all the other elements that go along with the site. It's a good thing we enjoy learning new things!

How will you set up your blog? How often will you post?

Some bloggers have a single dedicated blog page with all their posts, with the most recent one at the top. Because our blog would be focused on travel, we decided to use pages to organize our posts by trip. Each page would be dedicated to a single trip with the posts arranged chronologically. They would also typically include pre-trip planning as well as post-trip conclusions.

There are many other options to add to your blog—you can have readers subscribe and be notified about new posts, have a forum for comments and discussions, and have your new post automatically sent to your social media. This feature is helpful in that the link on social media opens on the website, where visitors can explore the "library" and other travel stories.

We have been blogging for a few years now. While I do most of the writing with contributions and edits from Art, we both contribute photos. The blog serves as a record of our favorite trips, complete with photos and memories of our experiences. Family and friends have been able to follow us on our adventures when we can post while traveling. When our location limits our ability to blog in real time, we write the blog each day and add photos after we return and post our story afterwards. It has also been exciting to share our blog with others we meet on our travels.

Equipment and Notes:

- Bring lenses you would use for street photography (35mm or 50mm) and architecture photography (wide angle), or travel light by bringing a good walk–around lens like a 24–120 or 28–300. Since the Metro station is indoors, a 2.8 lens or better glass would help you keep your ISO down.
- Tripods are prohibited in the Metro station.
- There is free parking on Sunday on nearby streets, including Independence Avenue, but the most convenient mode of transportation would be to take the Metro to the L'Enfant Plaza station.
