

ames Prochnik is a Brooklyn–based photographer focusing on lyrical documentation of the social and environmental landscape. James's practice is as a flaneur (French for stroller) and a wanderer, searching for encounters, moments, and mysteries that provoke curiosity and express the poetic potential of the world and the photographic medium. James teaches photography online for StrudelmediaLive and is the founder and editor of <u>The NYC Photo Community</u>, a web– based resource created to promote NYC–based photographers, events, exhibitions, and opportunities. James's photography has been featured in The NY Times, Lenscratch, Humble Arts Foundation, and exhibited in the US and Europe. He is on Instagram and his website is James Prochnik.



MARCH 19 (ZOOM) Deborah Loeb Bohren Theme: Making The World Go 'Round— Gears, Sprockets, and Wheels

he offspring of two photographers, Deborah is convinced an inescapable passion for photography was imprinted on her DNA. Raised on film and in a darkroom, she believes the essence of photography is the art and science of painting with light. Deborah uses her camera as an artist would use a paintbrush and thinks about her work as visual alchemy—a transformation not of matter into gold but of light, color, and line into art. Multiple exposure and intentional camera movement are essential tools of her alchemy allowing her to challenge reality rather than simply recording what lies in front of her lens. Patience, experimentation, and the benevolence of the photography gods are also integral to her work.

Deborah's work is part of individual and corporate collections across the country and her "Homage to the Cubists in Paris" was awarded 1st Place in the 14th Annual International Color Awards (2021). She has also had the privilege of participating in a multitude of group exhibitions in the US, including Sequences, Iterations and Permutations at the Hyde Park Arts Center (Chicago, IL, 2022); Any Shape or Form and Enigma at the Upstream Gallery (Hastings–on–Hudson, NY, 2022, 2023); iMotif at Sohn Fine Arts (Lenox, MA, 2021); Ricochet at the Katonah Museum of Art (Katonah, NY, 2021); and Rhythm of the Unseen at Soho Photo Gallery (New York, NY, 2023), as well as internationally at the Horsebridge Arts Centre's Abstract Rhythm & Blue Notes exhibition (Whitstable, Kent, UK, 2022).

Deborah serves as a judge and speaker at camera clubs nationwide, and teaches a range of photography courses via Zoom. She is also a regular contributor to Everett Potter's Travel Report, where she chronicles her global adventures in words and images. 

MARCH 26 (IN PERSON) Bill Corbett Bird Photography Basics and Much More

Since then, he's become an avid nature and travel photographer.

Taking part in activities at the McLean Photo Club, NVPS, MAPV/Nature Visions, and elsewhere have helped Bill to keep learning. He was also very lucky to find a friend and mentor in the late Bill Prosser, who is sorely missed.

Visions. After twenty–odd years raising their three kids in Fairfax County, Bill and Judy moved to Aldie in Loudoun County in 2017, where nowadays Bill does a lot of his bird photography in their back yard.

Covering equipment, exposure, autofocus, craft, and flash, Bill will share what he has learned and what you might need to know. Wayne Guenther Transporting Camera Equipment as We Age

very photography outing starts with the decision of what camera gear to take. The balance is between what the photographic opportunities are, how to transport the equipment to the destination, and finally, how to carry it with you during the day.

A road trip solves all but the final question—everything fits in the car trunk, although you may have to lug some of it into lodging each night for security reasons. If a flight is involved the considerations tilt more on weight and size, movement through terminals, security check points, and possibly customs and passport control. Which leaves the last issue—how to tote what you need at the shooting locations.



Wayne Guenther This article is about photo travel that starts with a flight, and how Judy and I have gradually changed our equipment, luggage, and camera transportation at our destination as we have gotten older.

Our goal now is to keep our total equipment weight and size down. The last time I addressed "Planning for Travel Photography" (Feb 23, 2021 E&T), our transport and use methodology was medium sized Think Tank bags on a small collapsible rolling cart which was great for the in-and-out of airport task and which allowed us to stow both camera bags in the overhead bin (along with the folded cart). Our on-location storage/use solution until recently was to the leave the Think Tank bags in the hotel and put two Olympus bodies, two or three lenses,

and extra batteries, (1) Into a plain small backpack with Tenba padded wrap protection while in taxis and public transportation for me and, (2) for Judy into her over-the-shoulder tote (AmeriBag Healthy Back medium size). We then had the option of taking one or both of the cameras out at our destination using a BlackRapid camera strap on one side of our bodies and a regular strap over the shoulder on the other side. The plain backpack and tote had room for a light raincoat, shirt, billfold, and water. The destination transport and use part has worked really well. Judy's shoulder tote is ergonomically designed to reduce back stress (a plus after her back surgery). An additional

benefit when in transit from lodging to shooting is that the camera gear is secure and inconspicuous inside Judy's teardrop–style shoulder tote and my ordinary looking dark red backpack.

On our international trips in 2023 we discovered that we still had too many bags when traveling by air/train/public transportation to our destination. We're just not able to lift as much as when we were younger.

FORMER EQUIPMENT PLAN:

1. We each had a medium–sized roller suitcase for clothes. We checked our bags for flights but when we arrived, we still had to move the bags through customs and various transportation modes to our lodging. On our last two European trips we used trains between cities and tram/subways to our lodging vicinity. Even two even modest

sized suitcases were tiring to hump up and down stairs along with our camera gear. Note that nearly all European trains have some steps from the platform to the seating with little storage beyond overhead racks. And elevators and escalators in train or metro stations are not a given, especially in France. Deplaning in several foreign airports often occurs on the tarmac where you must walk down the mobile stairs from the plane to get to the shuttle bus and then often up more stairs when you arrive at the terminal.



2. When we encountered stairs, we had to detach both camera bags from the folding cart, carry all three pieces, or if only a short flight of stairs, picking up the loaded cart (about 25 pounds).

3. The fourth piece in our luggage is technically a <u>rolling backpack</u> (Matein brand) and it contains all the stuff that's not clothing and camera gear including medicines, Kindles, laptop, cables and batteries, Covid test kits–all the important things you need to carry with you.

4. I also use a CPAP medical device, but it is compact and light enough to sling over a shoulder between airport and lodging.

So, in our continuing quest to simplify our transport and use of camera gear and clothing, we have modified our packing routine.

MODIFIED EQUIPMENT PLAN:

1. We are limiting our camera equipment to two Olympus OM–1 bodies and two lenses—a 12–40mm f2.8 and a 40–150 f.4. We are both using iPhones, too, especially for wide–angle shots. We carry extra batteries, chargers, and SDHC cards—no filters and no tripods.

2. We have both replaced our Think Tank camera bags with Tenba BYOB (Bring Your Own Bag) inserts that slide into the Matein roller bag (for Judy), and a <u>Patagonia Refugio 26L day pack</u> (for me). The BYOB inserts provide equipment protection in transit to lodging. When out shooting Judy uses her AmeriBag tote as she has before (usually with her second camera and lens protected with a Tenba wrap), and I have the Patagonia bag on my back (about 10 pounds) with one body sitting on top of the BYOB insert protected in a Tenba wrap. It is larger than my above–described pack with more room for additional clothes, and the water bottles are more secure. Both bags fit in overhead storage (plane or train), and the Patagonia bag fits under the seat if necessary.

3. We are packing fewer clothes and personal accessories with wash and dry fabrics for socks and undies, and we use Booking.com to find an apartment with laundry facilities before the trip's end. So, each of us still has a roller suitcase that we check, but it's smaller and lighter than before, easing some of the burden on getting up steps and placing them on trains/public transit.

In summary, our flight–based transport and utilization scheme has gone from four rolling pieces (one with two camera bags attached by bungie cords to a collapsible rolling cart) and the CPAP, to three rolling pieces, the CPAP, and one carried backpack. When our clothing luggage is checked we have one roller bag, a backpack and CPAP transiting the terminal and getting on and off planes. When getting on and off trains on our way to lodging, Judy manages one clothing roller bag and the CPAP, with Wayne managing one clothing roller bag, the Matein general purpose roller bag, and wearing the backpack with his camera equipment. On–site shooting is the with same setup with cameras in Judy's shoulder tote and my Tenba BYOB converted backpack.

We hope our days of "wrestling" with all of our bags and equipment are behind us.









MARCH 9 (IN PERSON) Belle Haven/Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve 7:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. (rain date March 10)

s spring approaches, it's time for our annual wildlife photography outing, this year at Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve in Alexandria, VA. The Dyke Marsh trail, which begins at Belle Haven Park, is an out–and–back trail through woodland with water on one or both sides, and views of the Potomac River and sailboats moored at the adjacent Belle Haven Marina. There is an eagle's nest, and bald eagles can often be seen flying between it and various trees or snags along the trail. Waterfowl and songbirds are often seen, and foxes and barred owls have been seen there on occasion. For those who want to get there early, sunrise can be seen and is often reflected in the water along both of the small sandy beaches on the left/east side of the trail. Parking is very close to the start of the trail and there are benches along the trail, making it an easy and enjoyable outing.

When:

Saturday, March 9, from 7:00 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. (rain date Sunday, March 10, from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. Note—We will turn clocks ahead one hour that morning)

Equipment:

- For wildlife, a telephoto lens—the more reach the better
- If you want to make early morning landscape images, bring a standard or wide-angle lens
- Tripods or monopods are helpful and permitted but not necessary
- Hiking boots or walking shoes are advised since the trail is not paved

- Dyke Dyke Marsh Wildlife Preserve George Washington Memorial Parkway (south of Old Town) Alexandria, VA
- Parking lot coordinates: 38.7781188, -77.0512829

Notes:

- We will meet at the start of the Dyke Marsh trail at 7:00 a.m. and start walking the trail together. If you arrive late you are bound to run into NVPS members since there is only one place to enter and exit the trail. Sunrise on March 9 will be at 6:29 a.m. If you want to go in earlier than 7:00 a.m. to catch the beautiful morning light, we will see you on the trail.
- Park in the parking lot (first left turn—and only turn—after you enter from the GW Parkway) and not on the road leading to the marina which is for marina users only. Park police officers are starting to enforce this parking rule.

- After completing the Dyke Marsh Trail, you want to do more exploring, drive your car to the north end of the parking lot and explore the tidal marsh area where waterfowl can often be seen. Be mindful of runners and cyclists since that path is part of the Mount Vernon trail and often gets heavy use.
- Restrooms are located between the parking lot and the Mount Vernon trail as well as at the Belle Haven Marina.
