
Frank Van Riper

Photographing in a Foreign Country

rank Van Riper is an award—winning documentary and fine
 art photographer, journalist, author, and lecturer whose work has been published internationally.

His photographs are in the permanent collections of the National Portrait Gallery (Washington, DC), as well as in the Portland Museum of Art (Portland, ME). His 1998 book of photography and essays, Down East Maine/A World Apart, was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize and won the silver award for photography from the Art Director's Club of Metropolitan Washington.

His latest book is Recovered Memory: New York & Paris 1960–

1980, which immediately became an Amazon bestseller. His previous book, done in collaboration with his wife and professional partner Judith Goodman, was Serenissima: Venice in Winter, a coffee table collection of black and white photographs and essays, published in 2008 both in the US and Italy. Their next collaboration—and their first book in color—is The Green Heart of Italy: Umbria and its Ancient Neighbors (Fall, 2025). Frank's book sales site is Goodman—Van Riper Photo Store.

Van Riper was a member of the New York Daily News Washington Bureau for 20 years, serving as White House correspondent, national political correspondent, and Washington Bureau news editor. He was a 1979 Nieman Fellow at Harvard. In 1982 he partnered with his wife in commercial and documentary photography. In 1992,

Van Riper became photography columnist of the Washington Post, where his column, "Talking Photography," appeared for 19 years. It now is now available at TalkingPhotography.

A popular teacher and lecturer, Van Riper is on the faculty of PhotoWorks at Glen Echo Park, MD, and has lectured and/or taught in the Smithsonian Resident Associates Program, the Maine Photographic Workshops, the University of Maine at Machias, and at other colleges and universities in the mid–Atlantic region.

In his presentation Frank will discuss photographing in a foreign country, and include images made by him and his wife in Umbria, Venice, Paris, England, and Japan. Among other things, Frank will discuss how he gets people to let him photograph their daily lives and activities, the best times to shoot on the street, why the most popular tourist attractions often are the worst venues for great photography, and how to loosen someone up even when you don't speak the language.

Life is a journey, not a destination.


ohn's photographic journey began almost 50 years ago. After meeting new friends who were photo enthusiasts, including past NVPS President

As his family grew, time available to pursue photography became limited. After retiring from the federal Government in 2015, John resumed his interest by joining the NVPS and the OLLI Photo Club (OPC). Along with fellow NVPS member, Ed Marion, he is a co—coordinator of the OPC which is a part of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at George Mason University. John thanks all of the NVPS

im's introduction to photography was at around age seven when his dad converted a coal bin (they now had gas heat) to his darkroom. However, Jim's interest really took off in college. He has been a member of NVPS since 2018 having moved to Virginia from Southern California to be with his grandson and his family. His past work has been published in Black and White Magazine, LensWork and LensWork's "Seeing in Sixes." Jim has been a Canon shooter forever—he still has his FTB, TL, and F1 cameras as "museum" pieces.

During the post–World War II era of the late 20th century, the northern suburbs of Chicago saw dramatic development of residential and commercial construction. To preserve portions of the natural forest which originally covered the land, the Illinois Forest Preserves were created by the various counties in the area. As Jim grew up there, the forest preserves always impressed him with their state of natural, undeveloped character. Through the seasons, the forest areas changed their colors in the fall, were covered with snow in the winter, were inundated with spring rain, and provided a lush canopy of green in the summer months. When his parents moved

to a retirement community near the Des Plaines River in 2008, Jim began to photograph this portion of the preserves during his periodic visits. Over ten years, Jim captured images of the preserves and the river in all states of weather during the seasons.

ayne is an ecologist—naturalist, educator, and photographer with a master's degree in education. Over his career, he worked for the Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Park Service, and the Navy Photographic Center. He has spent 45 years in science education in public schools and universities. He has taught a variety of photography classes, led photography tours, and has presented educational nature photography programs in the Mid—Atlantic region, the UK, and Australia. He has

received multiple awards from Natures Best, North American Nature Photography Association (NANPA), and several other photography organizations. His photos have been published in a variety of media and appeared in fine art exhibits as well as stock photography around the globe. His web site is Nature is Wild Photography.

The average visitors spend two days visiting Yellowstone, with all their time on roads connecting them to the big—name features such as Old Faithful, Yellowstone Falls, Mammoth Hot Springs, and some other geyser basin features.

They seldom stop even to view some other features along the way in their rush to get to the next "big thing." They "hike" the board walks around some of the geyser basins but little else in their rush to "see it all." There is so much more to see and do in the world's first national park that is 2.2 million acres of treasures.

Wayne will share some of the "undiscovered gems" that are commonly overlooked. This will be from his perspective as a Yellowstone Ranger and as a photographer, and will include boating, hiking, and even camping or sleeping on your boat docked at the public marina at the largest natural freshwater lake in the country.

An Update on the Al Tech Craze in Photography

"Any sufficiently advanced technology is indistinguishable from magic."

t has been 18 months since I wrote a guest article for the March 2023 issue of FotoFax titled "The Al Tech Craze—Pandora's Box or a New Tool?" In the modern world of technology, 18 months is an eon, so I thought I'd take another look at Artificial Intelligence (AI) and what is new as it relates to photography.

In reality, the speed and growth of AI capabilities is almost startling. Melissa Kolbe, an AI Strategist, authored an article titled "The State of AI in September 2024: A Business Leader's Guide to the Future" on the open platform "Medium" which suggested this possible generational leap timeline for AI:

- Generation 1 (2022)—Al assistants like ChatGPT provided basic task automation
- ► Generation 2 (2023–2024 NOW)—Al is more advanced with improved capabilities, complex task handling, and improved content understanding
- ► Generation 3 (2025–2026)—Al promises significant advancements in reasoning and capabilities including advanced analysis
- ► Generation 4+—Al will move into autonomous decision—making, solving complex challenges

This rapid development seems almost scary, but this generational leap is also occurring for Al–driven creative tools for photography, graphic design, digital art, and illustration. We have seen the photographic post–processing tools in software packages, like Adobe Photoshop, Topaz Photo Al, ON1 Raw, and Skylum Luminar NEO, incorporate artificial intelligence to drive their software, improving the core workflow for photographers. Time—consuming tasks like cloning and removing unwanted items used to take much longer to complete and produced mixed results. Tools in Photoshop such as the "Remove Tool" and "Content Aware Fill" have gotten faster, "smarter," and more capable,

reducing post—processing time. I've been amazed to see how much better and faster these tools have become since the software firms introduced them. In fact, the Beta version of Photoshop has just released a new nested "Find Distractions" in the "Remove Tool" which magically removes "people" or "wires and cables" without your having to select them. It's pretty amazing.

Not all of the Al tools available will appeal to all photographers, and text—generated images cannot be used in NVPS competition entries. Our NVPS competition rules state: "No portion of an image, e.g., sky, may originate with another photographer, and every portion of a photograph submitted by a photographer must originate from images captured by the photographer submitting the image to the competition." Understandably, then, images generated through text prompts may not be in the competition.

But that doesn't mean that we shouldn't experiment with these AI tools nor should we ignore images totally designed through the use of AI as another creative outlet. I have even seen juried competitions popping up that are solely for art created through AI.

Why would you want to try these new creative tools?


- ▶ You might want to see what a composite of different elements might look like. By selecting the area where you want to add something and typing a text prompt in the generative fill panel in the top row of Photoshop tools, and pressing "generate," you can see what it would look like. Then you can find one of your own images to replace the composite and delete the generated one.
- Al could also generate subject matter that might inspire you to go out to capture this idea with your camera.
- It would allow you to push your creative boundaries and learn new skills.

Two photography educators I know have embraced AI as a new creative tool to create pretty amazing images (and they always identify work which they have created with AI). Jim Zuckerman, our NVPS judge from October 2023, is a professional photographer, photography educator, and workshop leader. He now offers an online class titled "AI Image Making—Push the Boundaries of Your Imagination" and has AI image galleries on his website in addition to his photo galleries of many different subjects.

Blake Rudis, our NVPS speaker from May 2023 and a professional photographer and educator at <u>F64 Academy</u>, has been using the software <u>Midjourney</u> for multiple years now to create his conceptual art through text prompts. Blake has numerous training videos on his YouTube Channel including one you should watch called "The Artificial Elephant in the Room."

He then uses a program called <u>Magnific AI</u> to make the images generated in AI appear more detailed and realistic.

I looked at the website for Magnific AI and I would encourage you to just look at their home page which describes the software's capabilities as "An Image upscaler, enhancer, and transformer that feels like magic." This is one image on the site that shows the "before" and "after" of a portrait using the software. I have no idea if it was originally an AI image or an in–camera photograph, but I was certainly amazed.

One of the newer tools I have used in Photoshop is their text–driven "Generative Fill" tool with a reference image to prepare personalized greeting cards for my family. In essence, it is Al–generated but with my own image taken into consideration. My granddaughter, Hannah, wants to major in biochemistry in college. For her high school graduation card, I made an image in Photoshop by using a picture of Hannah as a reference and then typing the text prompt, "young woman dressed in a white lab coat facing the camera and smiling with a colorful lab behind her filled with lots of beakers and vials in a horizontal format" with a Bioluminence Effect added to the generated image. Generative Fill created three images for my consideration. I was able to use my favorite Al image and then used Hannah's image as a layer to mask in her face. I did minor post–processing tweaks and turned it into a unique card. It was great fun, a learning experience, and it elicited a surprised smile from my granddaughter. (If you look closely at the Al text–generated image, you'll see that the face is not that different from Hannah's face in the reference image. My preference, though, was the card below which was the one I sent to Hannah.

So is AI a new tool or Pandora's box as it relates to photography? You will have to decide for yourself. As for me, I'm a convert to the new AI–powered post–processing tools which save me time. And, I've enjoyed expanding my creativity through new software capabilities and techniques. It keeps my gray cells activated and energized and I'm more aware of what is going on in the AI graphics world. I also think it is important to stay knowledgeable and current on AI advancements.

reat Falls is a DMV treasure and a favorite place for landscape photography. In November we will photograph the Potomac River and C&O Canal on the southeast end of the Maryland side of Great Falls.

We will park in the (free) parking lots across from The Old Angler's Inn and head over the Angler's Footbridge and down to the shore of the Potomac River, which at that point provides a beautiful wide view of the river and the shores beyond it. We will then walk northwest along the C&O Canal and take advantage of the landscape and wildlife photo ops that the canal provides. We will make our way back toward the parking lot on the same path. For those who would like to get something to eat afterwards, we will meet at Market on the Boulevard, a deli 3.6 miles down the road from the parking lot.

When:

▶ Saturday, November 16 from 8:00 a.m.—11:00 a.m. (post—trip gathering at 11:15 a.m.)

Equipment and Notes:

▶ A walkaround or landscape lens will work well. A wide—angle lens (camera or phone) would be nice for river and footbridge shots. If you would also like to photograph birds on the canal, you can bring a longer lens, although the birds will be relatively close.

- ▶ Parking is free and there is no admission fee at this end of the park. There is an upper and lower parking lot across from Old Angler's Inn, and restrooms at the lower lot. We will meet by the restrooms. There is free parking for visitors; it is also a ten—minute ride from the Glenmont Metro station (red line).
- ► The walk down to canal and river is moderately steep and the paths are not paved, so hiking footwear is recommended.

- ▶ Start at parking lot across from Old Angler's Inn (10801 Macarthur Blvd, Potomac, MD)


NVPS members have been busy creating photographic images, submitting them to shows, and getting accepted. Congratulations!
