

As we move deeper into winter, the shorter days and chilly weather can be a challenge for photographers, but they also offer unique opportunities to flex our creativity and explore new avenues with our cameras.

Ginger Werz–Petricka's cover image "Approaching Bison" is a beautiful example.

Here are a few ideas to get you motivated to get out with your cameras this month:

- ▶ Outdoor Winter Photography—Winter landscapes provide an enchanting canvas. Frost—covered trees, snowy scenes, frozen streams, and the beauty of barren branches silhouetted against a winter sky can result in beautiful images. Bundle up, protect your gear from the cold, and get out there even when it is cold. Don't forget that snow can act as a natural reflector, creating soft, diffused lighting that's perfect for portraits or macro shots of icy details.
- Indoor Inspiration—When the weather is too harsh to venture outside, consider exploring the warmth of indoor photography. Art galleries, historical landmarks, and local museums can provide interesting subjects, from intricate details in sculptures to the interplay of light and shadow on textured walls. Be mindful of location rules, as some venues may require prior permission or restrict the use of tripods. Indoor locations can also help you hone your skills in low–light photography, a valuable tool for your creative toolkit.
- ▶ Special Events and Celebrations—February is alive with festive energy, particularly with Mardi Gras around the corner. Whether you're drawn to vibrant parades, masked revelers, or the dynamic movement of street performers, these events provide a wealth of opportunities for storytelling through your lens.
- Post–Processing: Enhancing Your Vision—The winter months are also an excellent time to dive into post–processing. Use this slower season to experiment with editing tools, refine your workflow, or even revisit older photos to give them a fresh perspective. Whether you prefer subtle adjustments or bold creative edits, post–processing can bring out the full potential of your images and help you express your artistic vision.
- ▶ Field Trips: Building Community and Skills—Lastly, don't forget to join our February field trip to the Washington National Cathedral. These outings are a wonderful way to connect with fellow photographers, share tips, discover new locations, and practice photographing different subjects.

Let's make the most of this winter season together. I'm excited to see the incredible images you'll create this month.



# Kai McBride

# Diptychs and Triptychs—The Dynamics of the Multiple

ai McBride is a photographer, teacher, musician, and maker based in Santa Fe, NM. After receiving his MFA in Visual Arts in 2008, he has been teaching photography courses at the college and university level, including ten years at Columbia University in New York. Since relocating to Santa Fe, Kai splits his time between teaching online photography courses for <a href="StrudelmediaLive">StrudelmediaLive</a> and building and expanding his off—grid cabin on the Glorieta Mesa. There is something deceptively simple about the creation of a diptych—just put any two photographs next to each other. Add

a third photograph and you can call it a triptych. But is that all there is? If you take one photograph and cut it into three parts and present it together, is that a triptych? What's happening for the viewer when they are presented with multiple photographs that they are asked to digest all at once?

In this presentation Kai picks apart the photo-to-photo dynamics that can be used in making compelling multiples. He shows how you can explore themes, tell stories, and

present a visually cohesive narrative in a diptych or triptych. Grounded in the visual language of historical religious art, the contemporary photographer can express symbolic relationships in their work that are not possible in a single photograph.

Following this talk you will want to explore your own archive to create new sophisticated pairings—even from different bodies of work. In addition to helping you think in multiples, these techniques are useful when editing and sequencing photographs for an exhibition or book.




# George Bradshaw

# Nature and Theater

he two themes of Nature and Theater may seem dissimilar, but in reality they both involve aspects of beauty captured through the lens of the photographer.

And just as the photographer attempts to capture the natural beauty of a perched bird or a lone tree or a rippling river reflection, he also attempts to capture the actor's, choreographer's, and scene designer's representation of human nature.

George Bradshaw inherited a photo gene from his father who freelanced in the '30s and '40s. But the gene did not express itself until 2015 when, in retirement, he bought a Canon 70D; and has been having a blast with photography ever since. George caught the bug to photograph theatrical performances during an Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) class at George Mason University, where he observed actors "getting into character" at a moment's notice, transitioning to unmistakably separate personae—George wanted to capture these otherwise fleeting moments of nature and art.

# George Hogeman

# A Brief Introduction to Infrared Photography

eorge was inspired by a colleague to take up infrared photography in 2017 while they were both in India. They took black and white images of Indian landmarks and scenery. Such images feature dark skies and bright trees and shrubs. Unseen detail comes out in clouds.

George attended his first NVPS meeting in late 2019 shortly after he retired from the Department of State. He enjoys making and sharing images.

George will demonstrate how infrared images can be created with a regular camera or even a cell phone using a simple infrared filter. The next step up is using a converted camera with an internal infrared filter. In a converted camera, the internal filter that blocks infrared light which would otherwise blur the image is removed. It is then replaced by a new filter that allows infrared light as well as part of the visible spectrum to pass to the sensor. One advantage of a converted camera with an internal filter is that the photographer can use a variety of lenses without worrying about external filters.

### (Member's Forum continued)

A full spectrum conversion entails removing the internal infrared filter without replacing it. Instead, the photographer must use an external filter to block a portion of the visible spectrum. The full spectrum conversion is the most flexible although it requires using one of a variety of external filters. That can be limiting in that your choice of lens may be limited by the availability of filters to fit different lenses.

Such images look bizarre as if from another planet, but a red-blue channel swap using Photoshop or other software can make the colors more aesthetically pleasing. George will demonstrate how to do such a channel swap. Yet other filters, such as a chrome IR filter, can make pleasing images without requiring a channel swap.

George will bring a variety of converted cameras, filters, and has a variety of images for demonstration. Infrared photography allows one to see everyday scenes literally in a new light!

What lesson did I learn early on about my camera? I learned to check my camera before I start taking photos. How did I learn this? I was on a boat ride around Manhattan and I had my first real camera, an Argus C3. I remember pressing the shutter and hearing a "click."

When I released the shutter, I heard another "click." After getting home I realized the shutter was on a manual setting. That meant the first click opened the shutter and it stayed open until I pressed the button again. As a result, I had an entire roll of overexposed photos.

Moving on to my teenage years, I inherited my brother's darkroom. Imagine my surprise as I discovered that girls were interested in seeing it. So, I showed some girls my enlarger, the chemical trays, and how I washed the prints. I also showed them the switch on the wall. Lift the switch and the light went on. Push the switch down and the light went off. (Sometimes the light switch got stuck in the "off" position!)

I also learned how to do some "Photoshopping" in the darkroom. Somehow (??) I got a negative of a topless woman. I had taken a photo of a friend's girlfriend and I thought it would be cool to replace the head of the topless woman with that of my friend's girlfriend. He thought it was great. He made the mistake of showing it to her. They broke up.

Moving on to my photography exploits in more current times, I did a portfolio project in 2015 at NVPS. It was titled "The Day After." I was taking long (one minute) exposures of overpasses of the local highways. By using a neutral density filter and stopping down to f22 at this long exposure time, all of the moving traffic disappears. One particular day as I was on an overpass taking an image, a policewoman stopped and asked what I was doing. I asked if she could wait about 30 seconds and then I showed her my photo. She decided it was okay and radioed her backup to keep going.

Such are the adventures of a photographer!

### FEBRUARY 22 (IN PERSON)

# **Washington National Cathedral**

10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. (no rain date)

he Washington National Cathedral is a great destination at any time of year. The building's gothic revival architecture and nearby garden offer a variety of subjects. On a sunny morning in the winter when the sun is low in the sky, the cathedral's nave and arcade light up in a dazzling array of colors. The south arcade will be the most brilliant in the early morning. The north arcade doesn't get as much light, but the other sides do more than make up for that. You will also find the rose windows colorfully lit over the north, south, and west entrances. The light shining through the stained–glass windows lasts well into the early afternoon and is constantly moving.

We'll meet on a sunny Saturday morning to tour the facility. After paying our admission, we'll explore the nave, high altar, and southern arcade where most of the light will shine. Our group will hunt down compositions for a few hours and then take a break at the <a href="Open City at the National Cathedral">Open City at the National Cathedral</a> cafe. Inside, we can relax and enjoy a warm beverage or snack as we chat and share what we've witnessed. (Be sure to keep your ticket stub for re—entry.)

As this is a working church, please be respectful to others who may be there on business. Shy your camera away from parishioners to respect their privacy. Sometimes, the cathedral offers a noon—time service. If there is a 30—45 minute service and you are in the nave, you may be asked to stop taking pictures. This is normal. Try exploring the crypt downstairs. Take the elevator up to explore the south and north towers. Explore the architecture outside, or have a beverage or snack at the cafe.

### **Equipment and Notes:**


- ▶ A 24–70mm should easily capture most indoor shots but a telephoto (300mm) can be useful to reach the finer details higher up.
- ► Tripods are allowed, but caution is recommended. The church asks you not to place your tripod in doorways, stairways, or any other location that blocks traffic.

### Where:

- ▶ We'll meet at 9:45 a.m. outside the northwest corner of the cathedral near Wisconsin Ave., next to the elevator to the underground car park.
- ► If you don't find free parking along Wisconsin Ave., you can pay \$9 for underground parking at the cathedral.

New in 2025 is the addition of cash prizes for Special Merit, Best in Show, and Peoples' Choice awards.
