Our Nov 4 Program speaker is **Jim Clark** and he will dazzle us with his Program, "*Mason Jars and Memories*." Photographing from the heart is how folks from across the country describe **Jim Clark**'s approach to Nature photography. For Jim, it's not so much the techniques of photography that are important, but rather how photographers develop their own vision and personal style for conveying to others their excitement for the natural world.

In "Mason Jars and Memories: Discovering a Sense of Place," Jim will take us on a seasonal journey through the wild and rugged landscapes of his beloved home state of West Virginia. Using the magical qualities of the Mason Jar, Jim will showcase the landscape that ignited his passion for nature and life. Included will be a musical/slide program of Jim's photography that conveys an emotional sense of place about the beauty and wonder of the Mountain State.

Jim is the author of two books about his home state and the Appalachians – *West Virginia: The Allegheny Highlands* and *Mountain Memories: An Appalachian Sense of Place*. He is currently completing two more books about some of his special places in the country. This past year, Jim was President of the North American Nature Photography Association. Jim also serves on the advisory board for Nature's Best Magazine, and his photographs are on exhibit at the Jerry Payne Fine Art Gallery in Charleston, WV.

It's been more than five years since Jim first presented a program to our club. This will be a great chance to hear again an enthusiastic and inspirational speaker! We will take Jim to dinner at Chili's Restaurant, Tysons Corner, at 6:00 p.m. on Nov 4. Photographer Bill Silliker Dies at 56

Bill Silliker Jr., "the Moose man" died doing what he loved, while he was teaching a workshop in his home state of Maine. Bill was a great nature photographer, teacher, and gentle man. He was able to use photography to save the environment in Maine and how to enjoy wildlife and hunting through his "camera hunting" programs. He got his nickname from the great photographs and books about Moose he photographed in Maine. He was a former NANPA board member. Bill loved teaching, Maine, and photography. We all, family, friends, and many former students mourn his passing.

It was reported from Baxter State Park, Maine, that Bill Silliker Jr., a wildlife photographer known for his pictures and books about mooses, died of an apparent heart attack Monday, October 13, 2003 at the age of 56.

His pictures appeared in such magazines as Audubon, Backpacker, Down East, Field & Stream, National Geographic, Outdoor Life, Outdoor Photographer and Sports Afield. He was a columnist for the Bangor Daily News, the Maine Sunday Telegram and the Maine Sportsman. Silliker had worked for 20 years as a safety consultant for insurance companies before turning what started as a part time hobby into a full time job as a wildlife photographer. He produced four books about mooses and one each about eagles, loons and conservation. Bill had done a Program for NVPS Feb 2001.

- Meet for lunch at Hilltop House Hotel on East Ridge Street in Harpers Ferry at 1:00 pm. Extensive lunch buffet is \$10.95 or salads and sandwiches run between \$5 and \$10.
- On the return trip, consider checking out the small towns of Taylorstown and Lucketts or photographing various barns en route in the afternoon light.

Our December workshop will be on "Photographing Flowers Indoors."



George Corbin Featured

I remember my father handing me his old Pentax SLR when I was thirteen years old. Having only held an instamatic, I was baffled by the knobs and rings. In a one-minute training session, my father instructed me: "Just try to keep the arrow around F 5.6." And that was the last photography training I had for 25

years. The results were abysmal. I soon reverted back to my Instamatic, and relegated picture-taking to an as-needed function. Sadly, this means that today I have only 3 rolls from my 8 years of travelling through Europe and the

Middle East.

The turning point came early in 2001, when my wife and I took a 6 week trip to Hawaii and Australia. Not wanting to squander a lifetime opportunity, I picked up **John Shaw's** Landscape Photography and read it cover-to-cover in an afternoon. I underlined and I took notes. I learned what "aperture" meant. I discovered that my camera only sees 18% gray. I stopped keeping the arrow at F 5.6. And I was astounded by the results.

This unexpected success gave me new energy, and I signed up for a training class with pro photographer and author **Bryan Peterson** on **www.BetterPhoto.com** — I stayed in touch with Bryan after the class, and organized a Vermont workshop on his behalf last Fall. During that trip, Bryan received a call from a corporate client overseas. They needed him to do an industrial shoot next week in the Ukraine and Bryan needed an assistant.

The workshop and the Ukraine shoot were tremendous learning experiences. Watching a pro in action taught me a lot about "making lemonade from lemons," particularly in the dark, decaying steel plants of the Ukraine. Poor fluorescent lighting, extreme temperatures, open acid vats, flying sparks, leery workers, and of course language barriers required a fair amount of improvisation. But witnessing Bryan's incredible results – and his ability to "see"

the extraordinary in the ordinary – were an inspiration, and set a benchmark for me to aspire to in the coming years.

As a result, I try to observe certain "golden rules". No revelations here, but they keep me focused:

- 1. Keep it simple. Weed out the complexity, and find the single compelling element that makes a shot resonate.
- 2. Get as close as you can...and then get closer.
- 3. Slow down, way down. Look at every angle to find inspiration in unlikely places.
- 4. Create special projects for yourself to build a new skill.
- 5. Learn from others. Continuously.

Joining NVPS last year has also proved to be a great learning opportunity. I consider myself a novice, and can't claim to have a personal photographic style yet. But the competitions, workshops, and experiences of members have really helped me to refine my skills, and I'm grateful to all the members who have been so helpful and offered such kind encouragement over the last year.

I shoot slides, favoring Fuji Provia, the new Velvia 100, and Kodak E100VS. I use Provia 400 to capture my kinetic 10-month-old. I use a Nikon F 100, with Nikkor 28-105 mm and 70-300 mm lenses (which I boost with a 2X teleconverter when needed). I enjoy experimenting with macro photography (bugs are a particular fascination of mine), and I "tinker" with digital, for which I use a Canon G2. I scan my slides with a Nikon CoolScan IVED, and print using an Epson inkjet printer.



"Shooting Smarter"

When **Tom Gillespie** in "Shooting Smarter" (Photovision, 2003) referenced National Geographic photographer **Bill Allard** he was writing about striving for simplicity as a way to improve his photographs. Both follow a simple philosophy... "If it does not make the photgraph stronger, leave it out." And, the late Ollie Fife, a former NVPS member and accomplished professional photographer said, "Isolate and eliminate" as a way to make images stronger he was saying the same thing. Finally, **Robert Capa** is noted for saying "If you do not like your photographs it means you're not close enough."

One view of what makes a successful photograph is stated by **Andreas Feininger** (1906-1999) who contributed over 350 photo essays to Life Magazine. He says ... "the qualities necessary for a good photographic subject are simplicity, clarity, order and organization, well-defined outline and form, contrast that is strong but not excessive, texture that can be brought out through use of surace-skimming light, pattern rhythm and repetition and forms."

Seems there is a lesson being passed down that is worth repeating and trying as we all strive to create stronger, better images.

Second Annual Meadowlark Nature Photography Exhibition March 5, 6, 7, 2004

The following text has been approved by all six participating clubs and will be used by all of their members who wish to submit entries for this juried photography exhibition. It states the definition of the theme and sets forth the formatting rules for this event:. The Nov. details are being published so that our members can have a "heads up" so that they can go to their archives and determine what they wish to submit. This is a work in progress. Some details are yet to be determined.

1. Juror's Statement:

I will look for images that rise above the routine, transcend the ordinary, and that convey the love, feeling, and passion for the beauty and mystery of nature captured by creative and imaginative photographers. Attention will be given to the total presentation. A signature, if shown, should be discreet and unobtrusive, and the matting should be carefully cut to precisely fit the image. **From: Joseph A Miller**

2. Theme and General Information:

The theme of this juried photography exhibition will be Nature photography taken within the 50 states (US), Canada, and Mexico. This is interpreted to mean nature scenes and indigenous animals/birds/insects, etc. from the designated area. Photographs of plants growing in the designated area qualify, indigenous or not (examples: tulips, irises, Asian hollies, water plants, bamboo).

The judge will allow the hand of man if he considers it to be a minor element that is unobtrusive and not distracting. The judge will disqualify any photo where he considers the hand of man to be a distracting element.

Photographs submitted last year may be resubmitted this year, assuming they meet the formatting rules and theme. New work is encouraged.

3. The following format rules apply to the unframed photos, which will be the bulk of the exhibit:

Photos may be black and white, color, or sepia prints (digital or film). Photos must be two-dimensional; this includes composites, montages, and multiple exposures. Three-dimensional photo collages are excluded. Maximum display size: 16x20'' along the outside edge (including mounting and matting) - possible exception: panoramas are acceptable, the size of which will be the photographer's choice. A 2'' minimum mat border along all four sides applies to panoramas. Minimum size for prints: no minimum size. Signatures on the print or cover window mat are allowed and should be unobtrusive. Titles are not allowed, neither on

the cover window mat nor on the print. Photos can be juried while encased in UNSEALED clear plastic envelopes. The cover window mat must be securely affixed on all four sides to a firm, white backing. Affix discreet ID labels on the back. This label must include the name of the photographer, club affiliation, and title. The text of the labels will be used to determine the top of the photo; no arrows are needed. No markings should be on the back of the mounting except for what appears on these labels. Optional information may include a description of the photo, and a biography of the photographer.

Cover window mats are required.

Border dimensions: a minimum of 2" wide along all four sides; wider is acceptable. Color: white. Weighted and/or asymmetric mats are allowed. Mats with oval or circular interior cuts are allowed. Custom window mats using archival or acid free material are encouraged.

Please note, the following represent changes from last year: Double matting IS allowed, though not necessary. If double matted, both mats must be the same color white and texture. (Triple matting is NOT allowed.) Black-core mats are NOT allowed. Floating photos (where a white or colored border appears between the print and the cover mat) are NOT allowed. Cover mats must go to the edge of a print, leaving no void.

4. Framed photographs are also allowed, though the space for them is very limited. Each club will only be able to exhibit a very few framed photographs. The main emphasis of this event will be on unframed photographs.

Formatting for framed photos: All aspects of the framed photographs will be considered in the jury process; and, if any part of the total package is judged distracting, the whole package is at risk of being juried out (same as last year).

Framed prints are not subject to the same matting rules or size rules as the unframed prints.

The color, style, and number of mat(s) will be the photographer's choice. The sizing of all aspects of the framed photograph (print, mat(s), and frame) will be the photographer's choice. Space for these is very limited: 5 linear feet of wall space and one floor easel per club. The backing need not be white. A discreet ID label (similar to those used for the unframed photos) should be affixed to the back of all framed photographs.
